Contract Bridge

A BAD HABIT

It is to be suspected that the declarer's failure in the following deal, played at a small-stam contract, was due to the bad habit, (repeatedly mentioned in this column) of "rushing to draw trumps."

North-South vulnerable.

North: ♠ 10 9 8 7 5 2
 ♠ A Q J
 ♣ A 6
 ♦ 2

South: ♠ J 7 6 5 3
 ♠ 4 3
 ♣ K
 ♦ K

The bidding:
 North East South West
 2♥ Pass 2♥ Pass
 3♥ Pass 3♥ Pass
 4♥ Pass Pass Pass

West opened the unbid club suit and declarer's blank king won. Three rounds of trumps were now played. South winning the third round in his own hand in order to lead a diamond for the finesse of the queen. East won with his blank king and shifted to his low spade.

South now had quite a problem! The play was in dummy, and although the club ace was still there, the lack of any club in the South hand for a communication card made the establishment of the diamond suit a baffling problem. As the cards lay, of course, South could have ruffed the club ace and then finessed for the jack of diamonds, but with no knowledge of the distribution of diamonds, it seemed just as desirable to lay down the diamond ace on the good chance of dropping the jack. The jack did not drop, however, and South went down three tricks.

The obviously correct line of play was to cash only two rounds of hearts and the diamond ace. With the king falling, the rest of the play would be elementary, but even if the king did not fall, declarer could discard his second diamond on the club ace, ruff a diamond, go back to the heart king and if necessary ruff another diamond, supply establishing the suit and leaving the spade ace for entry.
