JOURNEYS BY AUTO.
 AERO AND SUBMARINE.

MAHE ISLAND. Cal., March 7—
 Ensign Kirkwood Donavin, U. S. N.,
 commanding the submarine A5, jump
 ed into an aeroplane with Lieutenant
 T. G. Elyson, U. S. N., at San Die-
 go and flew across the bay to the
 submarine wharf. There he met a
 brother officer who was driving by in
 his automobile. Donavin got in the
 car, was carried to the end of the
 wharf, where he boarded his subma-
 rine boat and five minutes later he
 was under the surface of the water.
 He claims to be the first person to
 fly in an aeroplane, ride in an auto-
 mobile and drive in a submarine boat
 within fifteen minutes.

ONLY 14 OUT OF 2,650
 VOTE AGAINST TAFT.

PHILADELPHIA, March 7—Four-
 teen of the 2,650 members of the Uni-
 on League signed and sent out a pro-
 test against the assembling of the
 membership in a special meeting Sat-
 urday to consider promoting the can-
 didacy of President Taft. It is de-
 clared that while the fourteen mem-
 bers are not care to discredit the
 Taft candidacy, they feel that the
 proposed meeting would be contrary
 to the policy and traditions of the
 staunch Republican Club and would
 inject the League into active politics
 before the convention had chosen the
 candidate.

GERMAN PRINCESS
 SAW PRIZE FIGHT.

BERLIN, March 7—Princess Char-
 lotte of Saxe-Meiningen, the eldest
 sister of the Kaiser, has become a
 patroness of prize fights. The dis-
 cussion is made by a German boxing
 master over the prohibition of public
 pugilistic encounters, who writes that
 he finds it incongruous that boxing is
 barred from Berlin in view of the
 fact that Princess Charlotte reserved
 a seat for last week's exhibition be-
 tween Carpenter and Sullivan at
 Monte Carlo.

PRINCE SAYS DIVORCE
 TALK IS RIDICULOUS.

NEW YORK, March 7—Prince and
 Princess Nicholas Engalischoff, who
 has been said recently, are close to a
 contest in the divorce courts, are in
 New York. They arrived on the
 Kronprinz Wilhelm. When left by his
 wife at the pier to look after the
 luggage, the Prince was asked if it
 was true that there were to be di-
 vorce proceedings. "How ridiculous!"
 the Prince said, and that was as
 close as he would come to confirming
 or denying the rumors. The Princess
 was Evelyn Partridge, daughter of
 C. W. Partridge, millionaire banker
 of Chicago.

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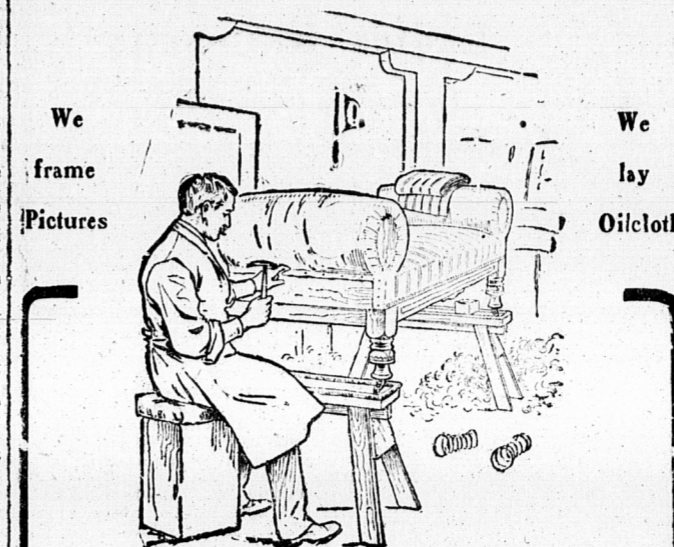
