Island at the next general election through a plebiscite. The Leader of the Opposition argued, I think, as long or perhaps longer in favour of the six months' script. I am glad that he now admits he may have made a mistake but he has not yet said what he is going to have the people vote on or how many people must ask for a Plebiscite on this question before he would, if in office, give them one. As to our roads, I ask any and every person who travelled over our roads in 1935 and who may have travelled over our roads this year, to compare the roads of 1935 with those of 1947, and if you decide how you are going to vote on the question of roads, there is no doubt but that you shall vote Liberal at this coming election. As to the Income Tax Refunds, I cannot believe there is anyone who was able to earn an income large enough to have some of it taxed, who would be glibly enough to bother to even think of such a ridiculous thing as that any government of this Island could dictate to the Federal Government as to its Income Tax policy, or call that Government before any Court and compel it to refund any Income Tax. One thing I feel sure of is that during the period between 1931 and 1933 when the Stewart Government, and also the MacMillan Government, was in office few farmers and not even a single fisherman had to worry about how much income tax they would have to pay as their incomes were, I believe, lower than during any period since Confederation, as far,

at least, as the purchasing power of their incomes were concerned. As to Old Age Pensions, the MacMillan Government was the nearest of all the Governments of the Canadian Provinces in their payments to its Old Age Pensioners. The other Provinces paid a maximum pension of \$20.00 per month, its maximum was \$15.00 per month. It also made a bargain with the Bennett Government to put a lien on all the real estate that might be owned by any old age pensioner and that bargain cannot be changed unless the Federal Government consents to such a change. The Jones Government in four years has increased the maximum Old Age Pension from \$15.00 to \$30.00 per month.

Fisheries As to fisheries, I cannot compare what the Campbell and also the Jones Governments have done for our fishermen with what the MacMillan Government did for them, because the MacMillan Government never did anything for them, except to refuse to rebate certain gasoline tax to them, that being the gasoline tax on gasoline used in the engines of fishing boats. The plank no 2 of the Progressive Conservative Platform, speaks of fish prices being now deplorably low. How does \$10.00 per 100 lbs. of lobster in 1947 compare with \$4.00 to \$5.00 per 100 lbs., the prices paid for lobster between 1931 and 1935? How does the price of 35c per 100 lbs. of hake split for salting and drying, in 1935 compare with the price of \$2.50 per 100 lbs. paid this year for unsplit hake. The 1947 price for hake being more than seven times higher than the 1935 price. I think fishermen would like to

know what the so-called "illogical prices" mentioned in this plank no 2 mean. The thousands of loans running from \$40.00 to \$500.00 made to fishermen through the Fishermen's Loan Board in the last eleven years, beginning in 1936, the building of many fish houses, of landing piers, — also, the loans made to Fishermen's Co-operatives and to private individuals engaged in fish packing and fish buying, to help them get needed boats, engines, fishing gear and other fishermen's supplies and the fact that a large proportion of the loans made this year were made to veterans of the last Great War, are going to be regarded as much more than lip service by the people of Prince Edward Island or, at least by the great majority of them. I feel that the fishermen of this Island are going to say with their votes at the coming election that it was the MacMillan Government that gave them aught but lip service and that the Campbell and also the Jones Government did make and is making an honest attempt to assist our fishermen in improving their conditions and in some measure assisting them financially and otherwise in coping with the hardships and difficulties of their work as fishermen. I think that the Hon. Marlen Gallant, who is a native of the great fishing centre of Ruskico and where in his youth he was a fisherman and Dougald MacKinnon, also a fisherman for many years, know as much about fishing as any of the Conservative candidates or their leader. As I have spent about one half my life as a fisherman, I feel certain that this Island's fishermen believe that I also can be depended on to do what is reasonable to get them

assistance through the Fishermen's Loan Board. It is the policy of this Board as at present constituted, to assist fishermen in getting larger boats and improved equipment — to build more fish houses, if needed — to urge on the Federal Government, of more boat harbours and the building and repairing of piers for the fishermen to use in dressing their catches of fish for the fresh fish market or for salting. This policy is definite and I feel sure the great majority of this Island's fishermen are going to vote Liberal at the coming election to have it put into effect, if the Jones Government stays in office. Steamship Service The declared policy of the Premier to have a winter steamship service restored to the eastern end of this Island, to run between Georgetown and Pictou, is a policy that everyone living east of Charlottetown should be glad to hear of. The restoring of this service would give the farmers and fishermen of this Island a shorter route to the Nova Scotia and other markets during the winter season and their shipments would get to those markets in much less time. The greatest of the old Hebrew Prophets speaks of a Liberal as a person who deviseth Liberal things and that by Liberal things shall he stand. The present Premier and also his Cabinet can, I think, qualify as Liberals for they have devised many Liberal things — the benefit of Prince Edward Island — things that shall be of increasing benefit to it as the years go past. I therefore ask you to vote Liberal at the coming election.
