

Saints Defeat P.W.C. 6-0 In Exhibition Game

In a well played exhibition rugby encounter yesterday afternoon at the S.D.U. gridiron, the third Saint Dunstan's University squad downed the second Prince of Wales College aggregation by a score of 6-0, with B. Jay, and Peter Dunphy doing the scoring for the Saints.

In the first half P.W.C. forced the play into Saints territory from the kickoff and were within scoring position when S.D.U. in a scrum got the ball out clearly, and in a series of smart, backfield running plays, took the game deep into their opponents' sector. The play then shifted back and forth from zone to zone, with each team taking their turn at having the advantage, until midway in the half when Jay, playing way out on the end of the Saints' three-quarter line, snared a nice pass from one of his teammates to make a beautiful 50 yard run to go over for the first try. The Saints failed to convert for the extra two points.

The Saints had it pretty well their own way for the remainder of the half and kept inside the P.W.C. zone most of the time, and were right on the Welshmen's five yard line trying to go over for a score when the half ended. One of their reasons for superiority in the first half was due to the smooth way their forwards worked in the scrum getting the ball out clearly, and keeping possession of it most of the time.

The Welshmen showed up better in the second half, with their forwards working better in the scrum and doing more effective tackling, but nevertheless the heavier University squad kept the play pretty well in P.W.C. territory, although the Welshmen made the score four on two or three occasions as the result of good kicking and backfield passing plays.

Peter Dunphy, hard working S.D.U. forward, made the score four for his team when he went over for a touchdown on a plunge play following a scrumage on the P.W.C. 10 yard line, well on in the second half. His Saunders' conversion attempt failed when the kick went wide of the mark.

The Saints continued to force the play until the last half, until the college squad put on a drive which kept the Saints deep in their own territory, but the Welshmen just couldn't seem to click on the final yards to go over for a score, with the Saints again taking the advantage in the final minutes of play, and being on the verge of going over for their third try when the game ended.

As the result of a short skirmish with referee Bert Sleep during the Moncton-Dartmouth Arrows game Saturday night, Buck was suspended for three games effective Oct. 29 to Nov. 3rd., by Judge J. Elliott Hudson, president of the Maritime Senior Hockey League.

The incident occurred late in the third period, when Whitlock had been waved off for a two minute tripping penalty and had a 10 minute misconduct added when he pushed referee Sleep. The reason for the suspension came shortly after "sin bin" and attacked referee Sleep, after the Arrows had scored a goal. Incidentally, Whitlock is the third place man in the "Big Four" scoring race. The suspension won't do his scoring average any good.

Still on the topic of football, the senior Prince of Wales team and the second Saints will get underway here this Saturday afternoon in the first game of the best two out of three series for the intermediate rugby title.

Both teams have been getting in some good practice sessions, and despite the fact that P.W.C. have already suffered one defeat from the hands of the S.D.U. boys in an exhibition encounter, the Welshmen have been making some drastic changes in their lineup which gives every indication of making them a strong, fast squad for regular series competition.

If no rink is available in Summerside, the games will be played in Kensington if arrangements can be made, he said. The matter of operating a Town League was discussed but no action could be taken as no information was available as to whether the rink would be in operation this winter.

25-To-1 Shot Wins Cambridgeshire Stakes; Canadians Hold Tickets

NEWMARKET, England, Oct. 27 (AP) — Sterope, a 25-to-1 shot ridden by an 18-year-old apprentice jockey, galloped to victory in the Cambridgeshire Stakes today and landed a betting fortune for his owner, J. B. Townley.

Townley, a Preston business man whose silks have raced only the last three seasons, won \$150,000 (\$500,000) by backing his three-year-old bay colt in one of England's biggest coups in 50 years.

But the horse and his rider, Dennis Schofield, had to survive a foul claim to make the victory official. The objection, on a charge of crowding, was lodged by jockey Charley Smirke, who finished second on Royal Tara, half a length behind.

In Dublin, three Canadians were listed among the 44 Irish sweepstake prize winners following the race.

The Canadians holding tickets worth \$10,000 (\$40,000) each on the second-place Royal Tara are: Albert Robbins of (227 River St.) Toronto, "Happy Days," ticket DR 29463, and J. H. Kern Jr., of (1053 Chestnut Ave.) Moose Jaw, Sask., "Lillian," ticket CH 40629.

Rene Cloutier (care of Dominion Stores) of Kapuskasing, Ont., who was listed as "Sousa" holding ticket DE 28365 worth \$5,000 on third-place Impeccable.

Carmine Scodero of Brooklyn, N. Y., held one of the 11 top prize tickets — each worth \$25,000. She was the only person in North America listed among the first-place winners.

In this 65th sweepstake in 18 years, hopeful ticket holders paid in nearly \$1,102,500, of which about half went for prizes, the balance to Irish hospitals, the Red Cross, taxes and expenses.

Jockey Smirke, after lodging his protest, said the stewards not only overruled his claim that he was jostled by the winner but fined him \$25 for making a "frivolous objection."

Two lengths behind Royal Tara, the French-bred Patchouly and the well-joked Impeccable finished in a dead heat for third place in the bulky field of 32. Royal Tara, a five-year-old carrying top weight of 128 pounds, and Impeccable started at 100 to 8, while Patchouly was 40 to 1.

Huge crowds flocked to historic Newmarket Heath in the crisp autumn sunshine for the classic at a mile and one-eighth, which ranks as one of British racing's biggest wagering events.

Western Duck Shot In Province

A strange duck shot at Pisquid Pond on Tuesday evening by Hayden Dixon, Summerside (formerly of Mermaid), has been identified as a male Redhead. This species is a duck common on the western prairies where it is seen in thousands during the fall migration. This is the second known record for the Province.

Mr. A. F. Calder, local taxidermist, stated that approximately 45 years ago he bought a Redhead duck in the city market from the late Samuel Gay, Pownal. In those days ducks, geese and brant were legally shot in the spring and offered for sale on the open market. Mr. Calder relates that on this particular spring morning he picked the lone Redhead from hundreds of ducks, geese and brant that lined the walls of the old market.

The duck bagged by Mr. Dixon was away off the beam as it is not a bird of the Atlantic flyway.

St. Mary's Wins 6-4 From St. John Beavers

HALIFAX, Oct. 27 (CP) — Halifax St. Mary's leapfrogged over St. John Beavers into a second-place tie in the Maritime Senior Hockey League tonight by cutting down Beavers 6-4. The win sent St. Mary's up alongside Dartmouth Arrows and dropped Saint John into the cellar.

Beavers, just one point behind St. Mary's and Dartmouth, can slip into second place all by themselves if they beat Arrows here tomorrow night.

Beavers outplayed and outskated Halifax in the first period tonight and for a while in the third. Otherwise St. Mary's were in fine fettle and when things got warm the goaltending of Hughie MacDonald held them together.

Hughie outshone brother Angus in the Saint John net, particularly in the third period when St. Mary's had to play two men light for two minutes.

U.N.B., Saints In 3-All Tie In Intercollegiate Senior Rugby Game

FREDERICTON, Oct. 27 (CP) — University of New Brunswick waged an uphill battle to gain a 3-3 draw with St. Dunstan's University of Charlottetown in an intercollegiate rugby game here today. The result pushed Mount Allison University far ahead in the race for the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island title, and U.N.B. clinched it in their game with U.N.B. here Saturday.

In an intermediate contest, the U.N.B. junior varsity squad edged St. Thomas University 3-2. The Islanders snatched a 3-0 lead in the first half of the senior game and fought off a stubborn offensive until well in the second half before the locals were able to knot the count.

The play was even, neither team having an edge in the opening half as the visitors used a fast style of play against the slow digged and tentative of their heavier opponents.

Then when U.N.B.'s fullback Spear punted to shove the attackers back off his five-yard line, MacDonald, in the fullback position for St. Dunstan's, received and attempted to drop a field goal from far out. He missed, hitting the red and black goal post. Cyril Callaghan, S.D.U. scrummer, was there for the rebound and ran between the posts for an easy three points but the Islanders missed the two points for the convert, which locked even easier.

The red and black steam roller offensive carried the battle to the visitors as the second half opened, but a couple of casualties which made some shifts necessary in the three-quarter line, coupled with the solid wall defense set up by the red and white, prevented the locals from scoring.

Finally, Keleher, U.N.B.'s outside three-quarter, got the pass he was waiting for when Len Wade slipped one to him on the 40-yard line. He carried it across after a spectacular run during which the entire opposing team made futile passes at him. Shepherd missed the convert from a difficult angle.

Both teams pressed hard following the try but neither seemed to have a scoring punch, and the count remained 3-3.
