—AGRICULTURAL MEETING.—On May 5th a meeting was held in Mount Carmel hall where various subjects relating to field crops and gardening were discussed. Mr. James S. Gallant, presided. Many ladies were present at this meeting. Mr. John J. Gallant insisted on the increased production of wool and stated that co-operative sales will bring more money to the producer. Rev. P. P. Arsenault encouraged all farmers to utilize to wards the growth of vegetables and green feed. The Rev. pastor thinks that is the only means to avert famine which seems to be so evident especially to the European countries. He laid stress and urged the farmers to prepare their soil fully well to receive the spring sowing and said that each lump of soil is an impediment to a certain number of grain stalks. He also spoke on extravagance and waste and thorough cooking in food especially vegetables. He says that perhaps in the near future a cannary for vegetables will be erected in the vicinity. Domestic Science was also discussed by the audience.—R.

ADDRESS AND PRESENTATION.

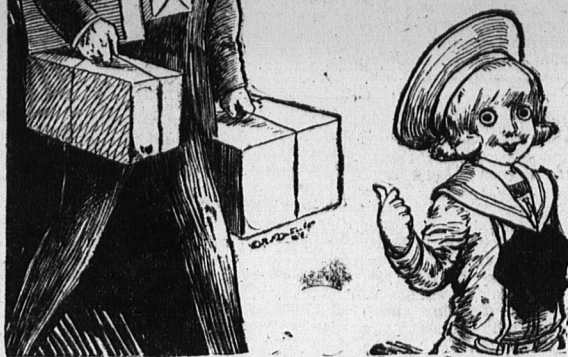

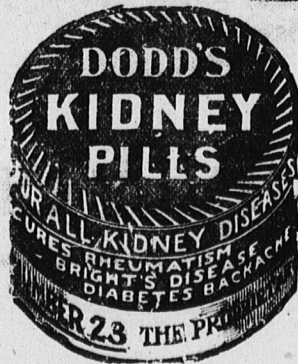
