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Brief Wind Storm Hits Province - Gusts of wind ran as high as 75 miles per hour in a brief storm which swept across the Province early yesterday morning. Little damage resulted from what was probably the worst wind storm in the Island's history.

The Telephone Company reported that a few trees fell across the lines on the North River Road burning out a cable and putting the long distance lines out of order. The line to Souris was also cut.

The Maritime Electric Company reported that damage was practical nil. The Brighton circuit and a few minor service wires were out. The top part of a metal staging set up outside St. Dunstan's Basilica was blown down and somewhat damaged.

The wind storm, which was preceded by an electrical storm, started about 3 o'clock with the wind increasing until it blew steadily at 50 miles per hour.

O'Leary - Certified and Foundation A. Sebagoes 65c per bus. Mountains 70c per bus. at the car. Light car movement with scarcity at this centre. Tablestock 60c per bus. at car and warehouse.

Wellington - Certified and Foundation A. 65c per bus. at the farm with Foundation at 70c. Tablestock 70c per bag at the warehouse. Heavy truck movement. No resale cars.

Summerside - All seed 65c per bus. at the farm. The heaviest movement of potatoes on record at this point. Some potatoes are moving out of cellars and a slightly higher price is being quoted. Small Sebagoes are 75c and a light movement of tablestock is bringing 70c per bag at the car or warehouse.

Borden Line - Foundation Sebagoes are 75c per bus. at the farm. Demand heavy. Certified seed 75-80c per bus. at the farm. Tablestock 75c per bag.
