BUILDING THE SHIP.

What It Means to the Workman in London's Fleet Road.

Amid the cheering of thousands of spectators, H.M.S. Black Prince, the newest first-class armored cruiser, has been successfully launched by the Countess of Selborne at the yard of the Thames Ironworks and Shipbuilding Company at Canning Town. Although the new cruiser is officially named the Black Prince, it will always be known in Canning Town as the "Christmas cruiser."

The fact that the Iron works Company was first exclusively announced on Christmas Eve, 1902.

Acute distress, owing to lack of employment, had prevailed in Canning Town for months previously, and the prospect of work aroused the greatest enthusiasm.

Flags fluttered everywhere, and large crowds of unemployed gathered outside the works, all eyes being turned upon the two towers of the company's works. When a Government order is received the White Ensign and the house flag of the firm are run up, and when, late in the morning, the flags were hoisted to the top of the flagstaffs, the crowd cheered themselves hoarse.

At that time 2,000 fewer hands were being employed in the yard than were at work a year before. Within a few months large batches of laborers were drafted in to work on the huge vessel, and for over 18 months past the number of hands employed on her has never been lower than 500, and often well over 1,000.

The new vessel, which is estimated to cost about £1,200,000, is one of the most heavily armored cruisers ever constructed. Her length is 480 feet, and her indicated horsepower 23,500. She is expected to give a speed of over twenty-three knots.

RADIUM MINE IN FRANCE.

PARIS, Feb. 22.—An important discovery of radium mine in the Department of Saone-et-Loire is interesting scientific circles. Prof. Currie's assistant is conducting the exploitation.
