Lenten Pastoral

(Concluded)

The whole nation cries out today for thrift, and we are told by the civil rulers that the only way to recover from the burden which the war has placed upon us is to live carefully and save all we can. The Church appeals to everyone to do the same but for other motives. Self denial is urged because it is the surest way to give the spiritual life room to grow. What ever slurs may be cast upon the duty of fasting, and however that regulation of the Church may be distorted, I am sure that mental, physical and spiritual power is gained thereby. I urge all to consider this carefully.

Need I urge the power of prayer? Its comfort, help and strength in all the changing scenes of life have been the experience of those who have made it a part of their lives. Private prayer as a habit is fed by public prayer. Drop or limit attendance at Church and before long our private devotions will begin to be limited and ultimately dropped. I urge therefore a systematic use of the special services which are provided during Lent.

As to Holy Communion but one opinion can be held by the Churchmen. It is the Lord's own service. It was His parting appeal to His disciples to observe it. No greater help for right living can be found than a regular preparation for approach to the Lord's Table. If through Lent we can learn to enter more truly into the spirit of the Holy Communion, we shall rise from the indifference and feeble spirituality with which we began our Lenten discipline to a bright and satisfying participation in the glorious Festival of Easter Sunday, happy in the realization of that greatest joy which mortals can conceive, our affections set on things above where Christ liveth to make intercession for us, we are one with Him and He with us.

Finally let your self denial lead you, not to a morbid or excessive individualism, but to the larger sphere of service and sacrifice, learning to give generously if time and substance for the cause of Christ, that His Church may carry on the work He left us to do.

May Lent of 1919 be an epoch marking season in the lives of individuals and through them in the heart of the nation. In one word use Lent as the Church directs and you will prove to yourselves and all others that the Church is the one power by which the world can be steadied and saved from the propaganda of those who look only for material advantage and forget that the earth is the Lord's and all that therein is. He has helped us in ages past. Shall we not have faith that He still will guide us if we are true to Him.

"Lead on, O Lord, Thy people still,
New grace and wisdom-giving,
To larger love and purer will
And nobler heights of living.
And, while of all Thy love below
They chant the gracious story,
O teach them first Thy Christ to know
And magnify His glory!"
