### Admiral Earl Beatty Arrives in N w York

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Admiral Earl Beatty of the British Navy, the gallant sea fighter with the Nelson touch, landed today in New York from the liner Aquitania on his way to Kansas City for the American Legion Convention. Being at six bells, the hero of Heligoland and Jutland was awaiting in his full dress uniform to meet the Grand Fleet which journeyed down the harbor on the tug Vigilant to bid him welcome to the New World. Admiral Beatty, his American wife and their son boarded the Vigilant. The tug noised the Admiral's flag and escorted by destroyers and destroyers, the party dashed to Battery Park. By the Britishers' side was his honorary aide Rear Admiral Hugh Rodman, who commanded the United States squadron that served with the Grand Fleet when guns were flashing on the North Sea.

Thousands of persons were massed at a Manhattan slip to greet the sea hero who was welcomed by Lieut. Governor Wood. From the Battery, Admiral Beatty was driven to City Hall, escorted by a battalion of mounted policemen and regulars from Governor's Island and a naval detachment. Here he was greeted by Mayor Hylan, and extended the freedom of the city.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Michael Larkin, formerly a well-known Halifax man, is in the hospital suffering from serious wounds received when he frustrated the attempt of a group of hold-up men who attempted to rob him yesterday afternoon. His condition is said to be serious.

Larkin was employed by a chain bakery concern and was on his way to the Washington Heights Savings Bank when the hold-up occurred. He was carrying \$1,683 in bills and was opposite the bank at 155th Street and Amsterdam Avenue when a touring car drew up to the curb. Two of the three men occupants got out and one of them attempted to seize the packet of money. Larkin resisted and was man Thoroughly, painfully wounded. He held off the men until a patrolman arrived. The man who had attempted to seize the parcel jumped into the car and escaped. His companion, who is supposed to have fired the shot, was captured after a chase by Patrolman Walsh. He gave his name as Charles Callahan.

Passersby came to the aid of Larkin, who still clung to the package of money, and he was taken to the Columbus Hospital. Larkin formerly lived in Halifax and was well known in amateur dramatic circles.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Admiral Earl Beatty of the British navy, who was elevated to the peerage for valorous service during the war, will arrive here tomorrow on the Aquitania, greeted by destroyers, airplanes and the roar of fort guns, coming to attend the American Legion Convention in Kansas City and later to serve in an advisory capacity to the British delegation at the Disarmament Conference in Washington. The Admiral will find awaiting here to welcome him, an old seadog who saw service with him during the war, Rear Admiral Hugh Rodman, Commander of the United States Battle Squadron that served as a

WASHINGTON CABINET IN SESSION

WASHINGTON, D. C. Oct. 19.—The cabinet went into session yesterday on the railroad strike situation. It was expected some Government policy might crystallize at the meeting and the administrations efforts for the present will be confined to moves along the line of conciliation and arbitration. Drastic action which might include court injunctions, the use of troops and in a grave emergency, the seizing of lines will be taken only after an actual tieup begins. President Harding it is known inclined strongly to the belief that the strike can be settled around a conference table. It was apparent to all Government officials that some plan other than that suggested by the public group of the railway labor must be put forward if the strike is to be averted.
