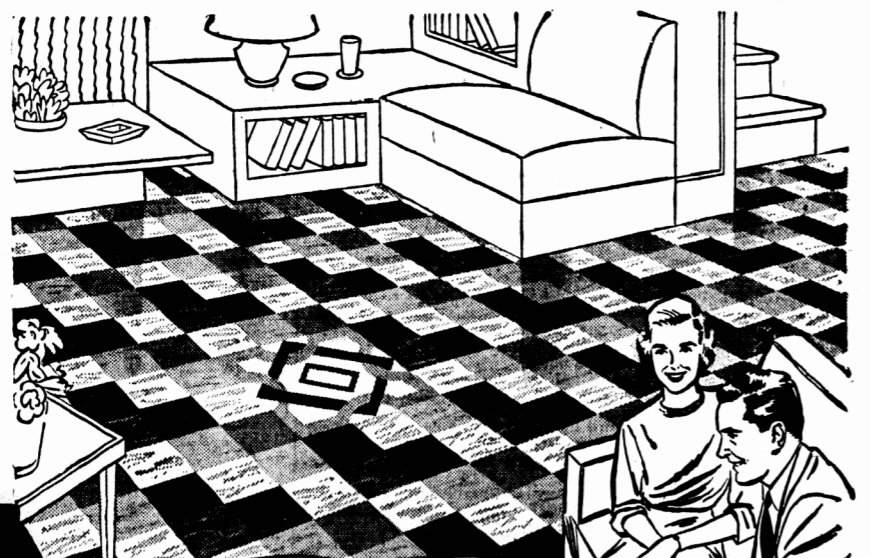

DANCING HAS PLACE IN STUDY OF WEST

TORONTO, Sept. (CP)—Multilingual Artemios Katselidis, Greek-born a recent resident of Saudi Arabia and a war-time counter-intelligence officer, should be an apt pupil at Toronto University this year.

Geared with a knowledge of six languages, a degree in English literature from Roberts College at Istanbul, and enough savvy to lead him through Artur's circle, Katselidis is determined to learn the North American way of life.

He is one of a group of eight young Greek friends, all sons of prominent Greek families, who decided after the war to seek their fortunes in English-speaking countries.

And to prepare himself for life in the western hemisphere, the handsome, dark-haired Artemios says he feels Canada is the bridge between the cultures of the old and new worlds.

One part of his savings is put aside for a very special purpose—dancing lessons.

ABSENCE OF WINE PAINS FRENCHMAN

WINNIPEG, Sept. 23. (CP)—There's only one thing which keeps a Frenchman from feeling at home in Canada, in the opinion of Emile Dambrose of Paris— it's the lack of wine.

"Water and milk and the common beverages of this country get so monotonous," M. Dambrose complained in his interview.

He manufactures paints and varnishes, and is touring Canada displaying a new type of interior wall paint which he has invented. The new paint is a heavy, oily fluid which when applied separates into two color tones to give a dark base. With a twist of the paint brush, the lighter-colored surface of the paint can be shaped into wallpaper-like designs with a bi-color contrast.

An ingredient known as "potato-flour", or starch, is the secret of the trick, M. Dambrose explained.

"More than 75 per cent of the materials, including starch from potatoes, linseed oil and pigments used in the manufacture of my paint in France are imported from Canada."

M. Dambrose said he felt France had made considerable progress since the war.

"But France will never be as happy as she was before two world wars," he said.

"However, you can't take a Frenchman's smile away. During the occupation the ordinary German soldiers took our way of life. If they'd stayed there a few more years we could have made Frenchmen of them all."
