TODAY'S CONVENTION

This morning at 10.30 in the Strand Theatre, the Liberal-Conservatives of Queens County will hold their convention for the nomination of candidates for the coming general election.

THE CAMPAIGN OPENED

"Do you think a Government censured by a Parliament in which the majority were its friends should be exonerated by the people of Canada?" This is the question before the people of Canada today.

Notes by the Way

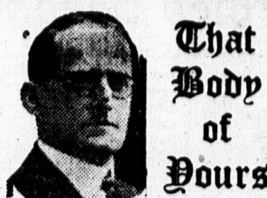
We are now in for as busy and probably as exciting an eight weeks as has ever been experienced in the political life of Canada.

Quebec realizes now that while a third party is a nuisance, a one-party representation is a snare. Since 1917 Quebec has been practically solidly Liberal because of its anti-conscription convictions.

Criticism has been levelled in certain quarters against the composition of the Conservative Government because it is not sufficiently representative of the soil and industry.

That Body of Ours

One of the interesting sights in some schools and factories is to see a number of children or adults stop at a certain time morning and afternoon and drink a pint or a quart of milk.

With others milk does not seem to agree, causing in some diarrhoea, and constipation in even a greater number.

To supply the nourishment and vitamins to those who could not take milk, some research men have been experimenting with orange juice as a substitute for the milk, in some Chicago school children.

This effect is attributed to vitamins and orange juice contains the three best known vitamins A, B, and C.

These Chicago research men suggest that these vitamins in orange juice promote the economical use of elements already present but not efficiently used, in other words the orange juice is a sort of "efficiency mineral" that makes the other elements in the food do better or more complete work.

Further that the orange juice stimulates the flow of digestive juice in the stomach to a greater extent, and thus these valuable mineral salts are quickly absorbed into the blood on leaving the stomach.
