MR. JOHN H. SHEEHAN of Montreal, who will judge the Charlottetown Kennel Club's dog show here on Thanksgiving Day, Oct. 13.

Mr. Sheehan is an all-around breeder, judge and exhibitor of all breeds, whose active interest in and support of the game has extended over a period of more than forty years. Since the early 1900's he has owned or exhibited such breeds as Fox Terriers, Boston Terrier, Irish Terriers, Bull Terriers, Yorkshire Terriers, Manchester Terriers, Collies, Cocker Spaniels, Irish Water Spaniels and English Bull Dogs.

In the latter breed, to which he now devotes most of his attention, his Ch. Kildare Chuck O'Luck achieved his championship at the age of thirteen months in three successive shows. In 1938, Ch. Kildare Chuck O'Luck placed first in a class of eight in the Open at Westminster Kennel Club Show at Madison Square Garden.

His judging experience is equally broad, going back more than three decades to the show held by the Mount Royal Kennel Club of Montreal in 1914. Since that time, he has officiated at such Club shows as the following: Longueuil Kennel Club, Province of Quebec Kennel Club, Toy Dog Club of Montreal, North End Kennel Club, Montreal Kennel Association, All-Canada Club of Montreal, Bulldog Club of Canada and the English Bulldog Club, all of Montreal; the Canine Breeders Association, Toronto, Ontario, Quebec Kennel Club, Quebec City, P.Q. and last, but not least, the Progressive Kennel Club of Toronto, Ont.

Thus, he brings to any judging assignment a wealth of technical knowledge garnered over the years in kennel and show ring, and a broad practical experience as both breeder and exhibitor.
