Hon. Mr. Sinclair And Dwindling Population

In the House of Commons on April 23rd, according to Hansard on the Budget debate quite a lively passage at arms occurred between Mr. Arthur, Parry Sound, and Hon. Mr. Sinclair, Queens County.

Mr. SINCLAIR (Queens): Oh no, Mr. ARTHUR: There is no question about it. My hon. friend shakes his head but I ask him if Canadians have not gone to the United States from his own town. I am sure he will not deny it.

Mr. ARTHUR: I have already given the figures for 1923. They were disputed by the Prime Minister when I gave them in the House last year but this session they have been verified by the Minister of Labour.

Mr. SINCLAIR (Queens): I asked my hon. friend to give an official estimate of the population he said we had lost during the last three years. The Bureau of Statistics makes such a report, but it is open to my hon. friend to obtain the figures.

Mr. ARTHUR: My hon. friend is entirely mistaken. I did not say we had lost population; I said we had lost good Canadian citizens which is a vastly different matter.

Mr. SINCLAIR (Queens): Population was the word my hon. friend used. Mr. ARTHUR: Well we have lost to the United States, in my opinion 500,000 people in the last three years, do not care whether the government is expending one dollar or twenty dollars to bring back those who have left.

Mr. ARTHUR: I should like to ask my hon. friend how it is the cities and town in Ontario and Quebec have a greater population than they had three years ago according to the municipal returns.

Mr. ARTHUR: I am quite sure he answer that I gave was a reasonable one. The trend of the population has been to the United States for many years, as my hon. friend knows, but in hard times unemployment is rife.

Mr. SINCLAIR (Queens): Does the hon. member mean that we have lost that number, that the population of Canada has decreased to that extent?

Mr. ARTHUR: I have answered that. I don't care a cent what the statistics show, but during three years we have lost five hundred thousand people to the United States, and the Department of Immigration of the government of which my hon. friend is a member cannot show one-half of that immigration during the same time that remained in Canada.

Mr. SINCLAIR (Queens): Our population has increased, as shown by the statistical department, and the increase has been as great during the last three years as at any time during the last decade.

I have appreciated the honor very much and my greatest aim and endeavor will always be to assist in keeping the "Charlottetown Rotary Club" on the crest of the world, and carrying forward its message of Friendship, Fellowship, and Service.

I beg to submit herewith my report as Secretary of our Club for the year ending April 30th, 1925. This year we held fifty-one meetings, one weekly meeting being dropped during the holiday season of Christmas and New Year. The average attendance of our Club for the year was 79.94%. Rogers, but we are strengthened by the reappearance in our midst of two former members, namely: Charlie Gallagher and Marcus Calder and the addition of two new members in the persons of Alf Pickard and Jimmie Murley. As we began the year with a membership of 60 the membership at present is 58, and one honorary member. Your Directors met at frequent intervals during the year and always treated the various matters coming before them in the best interests of Rotary.

C. N. R. Statement

OTTAWA, May 6.—Hon. G. P. Graham, Minister of Railways in the House of Commons today made the annual statement on the operations of the Canadian National Railways. The total deficit previously announced on the Canadian National, after fixed charges was \$54,860,419 made up of \$51,138,161 on Canadian National lines in Canada and \$3,722,258 on Canadian National in the United States. The total would have to be added to the deficit after fixed charges of \$897,062, on the Central Vermont.

The Canadian National Lines in the United States showed operating net four millions less in 1924 than in 1923.

Canadian War Veteran Killed

ROCHESTER, N. Y., May 6.—An autopsy indicating that George Towler, 37, Canadian war veteran, died of hemorrhaging of the brain, induced by a blow to the head in a fight yesterday on Andrew's Street. Corporal Maggio ordered that a charge of manslaughter be brought against Thomas Dugan, a local resident and another participant in the battle.

The victim, who was unidentified for several hours, was discovered to have been a veteran of the Princess Pat Regiment of the Canadian army. Dugan was arrested on a holding charge of intoxication and arraigned in City Court today. His hearing was adjourned for a week pending investigation.

Ottawa Ministers Are Protesting

OTTAWA, May 6.—A signed protest against the merging of the Ottawa Presbytery into United Church was presented at meeting held here today. The document was signed by seven non-concurring ministers and eight elders, all of whom expressed strong disapproval of action of Presbytery.

20,000 Rifflans Ready To Attack

FEZ, MOROCCO, May 6.—Abdelkrim, Moroccan rebel leader now is reported to have mobilized 20,000 Rifflan tribesmen for his attack on the French zone instead of the 4,000 previously estimated. The French outposts some of which were isolated by the first movement of Rifflans have been relieved by General Colombat's column, and the garrison supplied with food and water. Colonel Freydenberg, in a series of fiercely contested engagements is reported on Thursday Gen Cambay, after driving back the invaders has successfully repulsed a series of counter attacks. The present engagements are larger and more sanguinary operations.

Terrific Quake Is Recorded

OTTAWA, May 6.—Somewhere there has been a terrific earthquake, which if it occurred in an inhabited portion of the globe, must have caused damage akin to that which were recorded last night and early today on seismograph at the Dominion Observatory. Shocks were of such intensity and of so great a frequency that officials at the Observatory have been unable to determine the distance of the epicenter.
