Two complaints were made: one by the Game Inspector against a person for having foul salmon in his possession, which resulted in a fine of ten dollars being imposed; in the other the secretary was instructed to lay a complaint against a mill owner for dumping sawdust into the Dunk River, which resulted in the mill owner abating the nuisance by arranging a chute to carry off the sawdust.
