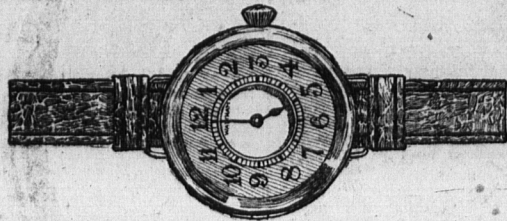

Y. M. C. A. SESSION RE-OPENING.—The Y. M. C. A. Rooms are being cleaned up and the gymnasium put in order for the winter season. Some new equipment has been secured, such as basket ball and indoor baseball outfits. A special hour is being arranged for the men of the Battery and the new Infantry Company on Tuesday and Friday evenings from 7.30 to 9 o'clock, which will give men ample time to get back to camp. Every recruit is welcome to attend these special exercises. The students' class will be commenced this week, when meetings will be held on Tuesday and Friday evenings at 4.15. The class for schoolboys will be held on Mondays and Thursdays beginning Thursday of this week at 4 o'clock. The prospects are very bright for large and enthusiastic classes this year, as a renewed interest is being shown in the physical work of the Association.

CASCAPEDIA WAS AGROUND.—On her last trip from Pictou the steamer Cascapedia ran aground when nearing Montreal. When the steamer started word for tug to tow her into deep water, the rumor was started that Sorel, six miles distant from the Cascapedia, and considerable excitement prevailed in that usually quiet section, until it was found there was nothing in the rumors. Just how the Cascapedia happened to run aground is somewhat of a mystery, as she makes her trips regularly and her officers are familiar with every mile of water on her route. When two tugs arrived on the scene the Cascapedia was soon floated, and proceeded on her way to Montreal, arriving there almost on time to take on her outward passengers at 7.30 in the evening. If there were any damages to the vessel they were so slight as to be of no consequence, and will interfere in no way with her regular sailings.

He received his first commission in the 8th Princess Louise's New Brunswick Hussars on February 29, 1904, but five months later was transferred to the Royal Canadian Dragoons—one of the permanent cavalry regiments of Canada. He obtained his full captaincy on March 10, 1913, and came to Salisbury Plain in October last with the First Contingent as Second in Command of "C" Squadron of the R. C. INDIANS BURN GO TO DEATH

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Sept. 28.—Eighty passengers of a Southern Pacific Mexican train were thrown into a car containing hay and the car set on fire by a band of Yaqui Indians Friday near Torres, Sonora, according to radio advices received here from Hermosillo via Guaymas.

Only 20 passengers have been accounted for, the others having been burned to death. The Indians, according to the report, numbered about 60 and were deserters from one of the Mexican factional armies. They first derailed the train, which was running from Campo Verde to Torres, after which they placed the passengers, most of whom were women and children, in the haycar and applied the torch. So far as is known no Americans were on the train.

Torres is a small town about 70 miles north of Guaymas and a junction point of the railroad, a spur line running into the mining district where Campo Verde is located.
