It now looks as if the Curran & Briggs ball team will be facing an old rival in their first adventure after Maritime honors this year. Meteghan has won the Nova Scotia championship and will probably meet our boys for the championship of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. Which takes us back to a bright warm day in one of the early days of October in 1947. We met the Meteghan team at Windsor, N.S. that day and were defeated by the close score of 9 to 7, although we were leading them at one stage of the contest 6 to 2. We'll never forget that outfield. It was a swamp and if the ball was hit far enough to land in the drink the batter was given two bases. The afternoon was wonderfully warm for October but cooled rapidly and spectators were a bit uncomfortable before the game was over.

If the last three victories scored by the Meteghan nine this year is any criterion of their ability they must be tough boppers to beat. They have beaten Londonderry in the last three games by scores of 14 to 5, 10 to 4 and 12 to 3. The new Nova Scotia winners slugged out 46 hits in those three contests. Unfortunately, however, none of these boys is a third baseman, and so it might be difficult to fill Les Gaudet's shoes at the hot corner if the big fellow doesn't get back. Dombroski and Cox and both outfielders and might help to plug the gaps in the outer garden left yawning by the departure of Gordie MacKay and Alan Stewart. St. John is a first baseman and with Jimmie Green sliding down that line, the R.C.A.F. court is available. Rumor has it that Sheen & McInnis, who have figured largely in hockey and baseball during the past year, get into the basketball game also.
