Dr. Keeping Addresses The Rotary

"The Social Aspect of Venereal Disease in Canada" was the subject of an address given at the Rotary Luncheon, yesterday by Dr. B. C. Keeping, Provincial Health Officer. He said the nation, the community, the family and individual are affected by social evils arising out of this disease, the solution of the whole complicated problem is handicapped by prejudice, sentiment and false modesty. He then discussed the disease under the following divisions: (1) congenital (2) intermarital (3) extramarital. He spoke of how the innocent child is

often made to suffer. Thirty per cent of blindness among children is due to this cause. A false attitude is often taken towards efforts to fight the disease by individuals who believe that it is a just penalty imposed by an offended God for immorality. The great importance of self control was stressed. He pointed out how necessary it was for parents to train the children in habits of self control with regard to their food, the hour of bedtime, the performing of certain chores, etc., and in this way the habits thus formed are of great value in exercising control along other lines. Sex education should be taught in every home, so that the child, the psychologist and the physiologist would be assisted. Educational information on this subject should be given to the public. Reference was made to the importance of extending the work among the clinics with regard to the disease. Every effort should be made to prevent it for the sake of humanity. Individuals and organizations should do their part to assist every branch and to co-ordinate their efforts. Past President J. A. Webster was in the chair.
