BIG DOINGS AT LIVELY MEETING OF MARITIME AMATEUR HOCKEY ASSN.

Large Attendance of Hockey Moguls And Others at Annual Conclave Held In Truro Recently.—"Residence Rule" Affecting Dartmouth And Halifax Satisfactorily Dealt With.

A Special Meeting of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association... was held at Truro, N. S., on December 4th, 1925...

Resolutions Passed By W. N. B. League. "Resolved that owing to the desire of certain teams operating in the various leagues in the Northern section of the M. A. H. A. to withdraw from their respective leagues and enter others; the Western Section of the N. B. H. L. request that a semi-annual meeting of the Northern Section of the M. A. H. A. be called at some central point at an early date to determine the same...

Resolution Passed By Halifax League. "Resolved that the Halifax Amateur Hockey League request the M. A. H. A. to pass a resolution at its next meeting, recommending to the M. P. B. A. U. of C. that the Residence Rule in its constitution be suspended in its relation to the city of Halifax and the town of Dartmouth...

Correspondence was also read from G. P. Bolton, Honorary President, M. A. H. A., supporting the Halifax League resolution. A. C. Pettipas, addressed the meeting to some length and asked the earnest consideration of every delegate regarding the Halifax resolution. He was followed by A. C. Wiswell who spoke in regard to the subject.

The following resolution was then presented by the Resolutions Committee: "Resolved that the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association, here assembled at a Special Meeting, December 4th, 1925, do hereby strongly approve of the resolution passed at the Annual Meeting of the Halifax City Amateur Hockey League, recommending that the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association suspend the Residence Rule in its constitution in relation to the city of Halifax and the town of Dartmouth with respect to players and that Halifax and Dartmouth be one district; it being the unanimous consent of this meeting that such a change would be to the best interest of amateur sport in the two centres involved."

The changes recently made by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association in relation to a new rule are of 40 feet and reduction in width of goal-keeper's pads from 14 inches to 12 inches were discussed and on motion these changes were not adopted by this association.

The "Playing Rules of the Game" as amended at the Annual Meeting, March 18, 1925, was amended to read as follows: "The goal-keeper may stop the puck in any way or manner he pleases, when caught, the puck must be dropped without delay either in front or to one side of the net, or cleared by being thrown directly back of the net."

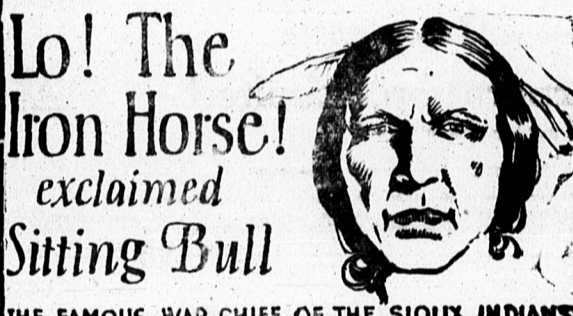
Rule 8 of the "Rules of Competition" was amended by making the following addition thereto: "All rinks where League games are played must be provided with proper and ample shelter for goal judges, such shelter to be so constructed as to isolate and protect goal judges from interference with or by any or all persons. Such protection for goal judges must be satisfactory to League officials in districts affected."

The subject of improved lighting in many of the rinks was brought up and this matter was finally left in the hands of the Executive Committee with the recommendation that the Executive Com-

Mr. Leggett of Chatham and Mr. Schryer of Bathurst placed the position of the N. B. League before the meeting and stated that if Moncton was desirous of entering another League the N. B. League would place no obstruction before the Moncton club and intimated that in the event of Moncton withdrawing, Fredericton would accept into this League. A telegram was read from the Marysville Hockey Club asking for particulars regarding their affiliation with a New Brunswick League. It was pointed out that the Marysville Hockey club was admitted to the N. B. League at the recent Annual Meeting of that League but on account of the unsettled condition of the N. B. League it was not certain that the W. N. B. League would continue to operate, and the meeting being adjourned at 12.45 p.m. The meeting again called to order by the President at 2.10 p.m. The New Brunswick resolution was then brought up and the matter was very fully discussed. Mr. Fred G. Kelly, Vice-President and President of the Northern Section spoke to considerable length regarding the resolution affecting this section and expressed his opinion that the matter should be settled at this meeting if possible.

Mr. K. C. Fraser presented an application from a new league known as the Southern New Brunswick League for affiliation with the M. A. H. A. this League to consist of teams from Moncton, Sussex and St. John. As this application intimated that Moncton was withdrawing from N. B. League and St. John and Sussex were withdrawing from the W. N. B. League, the application was discussed in conjunction with the resolution dealing with the Northern Section.

Five Thousand Extras and Workmen Braved Elements to Make Film

Rigorous Months Spent Under Burning Desert Sun and Many Months More in Arctic Weather in the Mountains to Produce Picture, "The Iron Horse," a William Fox Production.

Three years were required to complete "The Iron Horse," which opens a four days engagement at the Prince Edward Monday, December 14th. Members of the cast, nearly 5,000 extras and workmen lived through the rigorous months on the desert and in the Sierra range, in tents and lean-to shacks, enduring the same hardships so far as the elements were concerned, as those experienced by the transcontinental railroad pioneers they portrayed. Two complete towns were built in a setting as picturesque as that which surrounded Benton at end of track in the days when eastern newspapers described the settlement as "hell on wheels." Three tribes of Indians were gathered there, living in tepees and some merely in blankets, sprawling on the open ground. There was one of Cheyennes, another of Pawnees and a third of Sioux. They got along peaceably, but did not mingle among tribes. To feed the extras it was necessary to employ 100 cooks and assistants. When supplies ran low, a hurry call was sent to the nearest town and until the necessities came in, they lived on what they had. It wasn't always enough for comfort. There will be only two shows daily, matinee 3 sharp, night 8.15 sharp. To avoid waiting in line, tickets will be sold in advance starting tomorrow. Matinee, Adults 37c, Children 26c, night 52c, 37c and 26c.

On motion the meeting adjourned at 5.00 p.m.
