A POLICEMAN AND A GENERAL.

As to scattering paper on the streets the law in Germany is against the practice and the law is enforced. Jerome K. Jeome tells the story of an English General on the retired list, a man of imposing appearance and somewhat haughty manner, who was staying in Dresden and was unacquainted with the rule. He had just read a letter and had torn it into about fifty fragments, when a policeman stepped him and quite politely explained the law on the subject. The military man agreed that it was a very good law and that in future he would bear it in mind. "That is good for the future," the policeman said, "but we must now deal with what you have already done." The general did not see what he could do. The policeman explained that what was immediately necessary was that the pieces of paper should be picked up and removed. The general informed the policeman that he did not propose to get down on his knees and pick up scraps of paper in the streets of Dresden. The policeman politely admitted that the situation was awkward. There was, however one alternative, only one. It was that the general should accompany him through the streets to the nearest prison, which was some three miles off. Then the general suggested hiring a boy to pick up the papers. The policeman referred to the working of the law and found that this could not be permitted. The general reflected. He thought of knocking the policeman down and making a run. It ended by his concluding to pick up the papers, which he did under the watchful eye of the policeman and about a thousand interested spectators. Being somewhat stout in person the task occupied him about ten minutes. The general tells the story himself, always affirming that the law is a good one, and so well enforced that no one breaks it a second time. We can well believe this. But oh! for a little more German law on the waste paper question and a German enforcement of it in this good city of Charlottetown!

It says among other things: "We have more faith in the distant promise of the Chicago platform, not ignoring the many serious defects of that document, than we have in the miserable hell-broth of diswater and dynamite concocted at St. Louis a month ago by a party afraid to renounce its criminal follies, and tasted yesterday at Esplanade as a respectable candidate who declares with gusto that its flavor is admirable."

The Canadian expedition to Hudson's Bay has been successful in its operations, taking formal possession, proclaiming British sovereignty and setting up the Union Jack over a wide area of country, which while it was ours before was liable to come into dispute if some other nation asserted a claim thereto. Parliament has voted \$200,000 toward establishing customs houses and mounted police posts. All of which is a notification to whomsoever it may concern that "what we have we intend to hold."
