Russia Supports Agreement Re Trieste

PARI, Sept. 5 (AP)—Foreign Minister Molotov returned to the European peace conference today a few hours after his deputy, Vyshinsky, had declared that Russia was supporting the Big Four agreement to internationalize Trieste only because of "political considerations."

Mr. Vyshinsky asked the conference to "reject emphatically" all Italian claims to the Adriatic Peninsula and the strategic Adriatic port city.

The Soviet Embassy said Mr. Molotov on his return from conferences in the Kremlin stopped in Berlin to meet with Marshal Vyshinsky, who had been invited to discuss the German situation.

Meanwhile, the political and territorial commission for Romanians voted 10 to 2 to uphold the Big Four decision to award Transylvania to Romania, but with the possibility that Hungary's plea for 1,544 square miles of the area on the western border of Hungary would be held over for later consideration.

Bringing into sharp focus eastern Europe's massed front against the Italian demands, Mr. Vyshinsky accused the former Italian premier, Ivanoe Bonomi, of "cloaking annexations with the flag of justice," he said.

He said Yugoslavia's demand was based on the dominant Slav population in the area, and that surrounding Trieste, which has an Italian majority within the city limits.

Speculate On Withdrawal Of Russia

LONDON, Sept. 5.—The London Daily Mail, quoting "reliable information," speculated in a Paris dispatch today that Russia might withdraw from the United Nations Organization.

Wilson Broadbent, the newspaper's diplomatic correspondent, emphasized that Russia was planning to quit the U. N. but set forth the following indications of the "likely trend of Soviet policy."

"Influential Russians within the Communist party are no longer interested in the United Nations operation because they are convinced the western powers are proceeding against them in a concerted effort to bring them back to their own conceptions."

"That probably within the next few weeks the Soviet Union will let Russia sever relations with the western powers, retreat into isolation and form her own 'interim' organization as a rival to U.N.O. for preserving the peace in her sphere of influence."

Cost Of Living Up 0.5 Points

OTTAWA, Sept. 5.—The Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today its official cost-of-living index, calculated on the basis that 1925-26 equals 100, advanced from 123.1 to 123.6, a rise of 0.5 points, compared with a jump of 1.5 points in the preceding month.

The increase in the index since Aug. 1, 1939, when it stood at 100.8, now is 24.8 per cent.

The 1.5-point rise reported for June resulted in an increase in the cost-of-living bonus paid civil servants and promised a statement of explanation for the increase from chairman Donald Gordon of the Prices Board.

The Bureau said that clothing, home furnishings and services and the miscellaneous budget groups contributed to the increase at Aug. 1.

Seasonal declines for vegetables and fruits were not sufficient to offset the increase in prices for eggs and other advances for butter and meats, the food index rising from 142.2 to 142.7, an increase of 0.5 points, compared with a rise of 1.2 points in the preceding month.

The home furnishings and services series moved up from 125.1 to 127.0 due chiefly to advances in china ware.

The miscellaneous index rose fractionally from 113.7 to 113.8 while the index for the clothing, home furnishings and services group remained unchanged at 112.6 and 107.2, respectively.

Apple Harvest Of 1,600,000 Barrels

HALIFAX, Sept. 5.—An apple harvest of 1,600,000 barrels in the Annapolis Valley was forecast today by the Dominion Department of Agriculture. Last year's crop was only 362,000 barrels, the smallest yield giving 15,000 bushels a drop of 8,000 bushels is expected in the final crop now estimated at 30,000 bushels.

Final returns for berry production are expected to be less than in 1945 because of prolonged dry weather. The strawberry crop is estimated at 550,000 quarts compared with 240,000 quarts last year. Raspberry production will total 85,000 quarts in comparison with last year's 70,000 quart yield.

have said privately that they would like to retire. In the same category are Reconstruction Minister Howard Resources Minister Glen, Revenue Minister McCann and Postmaster-General Bertrand, Finance Minister Mackay has intimated that he would like a lighter task than his present one.

Mr. St. Laurent is reported to have said to friends that he would like to return to private law practice where he earned the reputation of being one of Canada's top-notch lawyers. Should he carry out his plan at the end of this year, Mr. Estey's position might be taken over by Health Minister Claxton, now head of the Ontario Department at the Paris Peace Conference.

Some Liberal members said Mr. Isley, who has carried the burden of the country's wartime financing since 1940, might succeed Mr. St. Laurent as Justice Minister. Falling from the list was an appointment to the Nova Scotia Supreme Court or return to private practice.

Mr. Col. Hughes Lapointe, parliamentary assistant to Defence Minister Abbott and son of the late Prime Minister, has been pointed to by some as the next Justice Minister.

Col. Lapointe, one of the most popular of the parliamentary assemblage, also has been mentioned as being slated for either the Defence or Veterans Affairs portfolios.

Defence Minister Abbott, who has handled the Finance Department since Mr. Isley left for London in August last, is another who is said to be in line for the Defence portfolio.

Dmitri Molotov, foreign minister of the Soviet Ukraine, laughed and said: "The Daily Mail knows more about it than Manulsky does."

Criticize Handling Of Indian Affairs Branch

WINNIPEG, Sept. 5.—Sharp criticism of the Dominion Government's handling of the Indian Affairs Branch was contained in a report made public today by the Ontario Broadcasting Commission's Indian War Investigation.

"The average 'pro capita grant,'" the report says, "paid by the government to all Indian residential schools for 1945 was \$172 which does not include the special additional grant of \$100 per pupil for the increased cost of living. It is totally inadequate."

Speaking of schools within the church field, the commission reported that the salary scale and standard of living are acting as a deterrent to the recruitment of properly qualified staff. The buildings are in some cases "old and unsuitable and have been described by observers as fire-traps and health-hazards."

At today's meeting of the Synod, Rev. H. H. Harris, Halifax, lawyer, was elected Protector (chairman) of the Lower House. His election marked the beginning of the history of the Anglican Church that a Lay delegate had been elected to the office. He succeeded Canon H. P. B. Woodcock of Toronto.

Rev. C. Lerol Moore, Saint John, N. B., was elected Secretary of the Synod, succeeding Ven. F. J. Sowers, Toronto.

Most Rev. Geoffrey Fisher Archbishop of Canterbury, addressed the bishop of Ontario, the Rev. W. G. Croil of Toronto, both veterans of the Second Great War, consecrably could go to the Veterans Department, although Mr. Croil and State Secretary Martin have been mentioned as next Labor Minister.

Should Mr. Martin switch, the State Secretaryship might go to G. Edouard Byles, of Montreal, son of Chief Justice Thibault, of the Supreme Court of Ontario.

The Postmaster General's portfolio also might go to a Quebec member Jean Lesage of Montreal. Mr. Lesage is frequently pointed to by fellow-members as being among the most eligible of newcomers for a cabinet post.

Fit. Lt. James Sinclair of Vancouver and Wing Cmdr. William Benedictson of Kenora, Ont., might replace Col. Gibson in the Air Ministry.

The outcome of by-elections this month in the Portage, Que., Toronto Parkdale and Portage LaPrairie, Man., may have a bearing on the extent of the cabinet shuffle. If the Government is satisfied with the outcome it likely would have no hesitations in opening up seats that would come vacant through cabinet changes.
