BRADFORD CLARK, Augustine Cove, was in town Saturday.
The foreign mail arrived from the Cape yesterday morning about nine o'clock.

It is expected that the whole railway line will be opened tomorrow at the latest.

WALTER MATHESON who has been detained for some weeks at Pictou is now in Moncton.

Miss RODD, milliner for Perkins & Co. returned via the Capes Saturday from a trip to Toronto.

A LARGELY attended and interesting mass meeting was held in the Y. M. C. A. yesterday afternoon.

SEVERAL repetitions of items appear in Paton & Co's ad today which will be corrected for next issue.

200 Baptist churches in the Maritime Provinces have voted in favor of union with the Free Baptists.

At the Gibson picture entertainments in the Opera House Friday evening and Saturday afternoon \$170 net was realized.

A MORRISSEY, representing Dearborn & Co., St. John who has been touring the Island for some weeks drove from Hunter River to town Saturday.

The funeral of the late Mrs. W. J. Boswall will take place from her late residence, Rochford Square, at 2:30 this afternoon. Service at 2 o'clock.

The funeral of the late Ninian Patterson will take place at 2:30 this afternoon from the residence of Sidney Grey, Orlebar Street, to the People's Cemetery.

The Stanley leaves this morning for the ice off Pictou with all the perishable freight now at Georgetown. It is expected that she will return this afternoon.

By actual count, James Paton & Co., are showing their first floor over 9,000 yards of floor covering which amount would cover a distance of about four miles.

It is expected that all mail courier team services except the regular ones will be discontinued this evening as it is thought the entire railway line will then be cleared.

RAILWAY authorities say that the railway snow fences on which much labor was spent last fall have in almost every case this year made the track much worse than ever before.

HERBERT GREY, formerly with Simpson Bros, Halifax returned from England Saturday and will shortly open up a wholesale lobster business on his own account in this city.

At a meeting of the congregation of St. Dunstan's Cathedral held last night it was decided to hold a bazaar during Exhibition week this year to raise funds for paying off the debt on the new Cathedral.

THERE was no crossing at the Capes yesterday. Arrangements were made Friday evening with the ice boat men to cross from each side yesterday but the formentine men telegraphed yesterday morning that they would not make the trip and when the Traverse men heard this they refused also to cross to the mainland.

The burial service of the late John Hanley, Murray Harbor South was conducted in the Methodist Church, on Tuesday, the 28th inst., by Rev. A. E. Chapman. The pall-bearers were: W. A. Horton, W. W. Herring, Josiah Roberts, Mark Senebaugh, John McKinnon, David Reynolds. Mrs. Hanley would like to thank all the friends and neighbors for their many acts of kindness during her late husband's illness.

MUCH interest is being taken in the Temperance cause. Through the country comes good reports of work done in the Divisions and in the city. Victoria Division a one initiated in one month just past, thirty one new members and seventeen more have been balloted for besides eight or ten new propositions to go in this evening when the majority of those are to be initiated. Well done, the few good and faithful, success to the cause. It is also understood that the Royal Crusaders are to be called together early this week to meet weekly till the holiday season.

Mrs. Henry Jamieson, Boston, was one of the passengers that arrived here on Saturday evening by the train from Georgetown with the remains of her father, the late Ninian Patterson. She left Boston on Feb. 6th, but had to wait at Pictou nearly four weeks before she succeeded in getting to the Island. She is at present staying with her sister, Mrs. Sidney Grey. Mrs. Jamieson speaks in the highest terms of praise for the kindness extended to her by the officials on the steamers and trains, who did every thing in their power to help her in the trying circumstances.

CONDUCTOR HIBBERT had two engines and a snow plow on his train to Georgetown last night.

The crossings on Hillsboro ice were much improved yesterday by the frost of the previous night, the water running off and the Government efforts. A horse could be driven over without difficulty either to Southport or to Kelly's Cove.

THE crossings at the Capes Saturday were heavy. Boats with 57 bags mail and six passengers left Cape Tormentine at 7:50 arriving at 3:10. They left Cape Traverse at 7:45 with 22 bags mail and five passengers reaching the mainland at 2:41.

St. John's Telegram, 15th: The S. S. Coban, Capt. McPhail, got in at 9:30 today. She left Louisburg at daylight Saturday, met ice at once and went through it for 50 miles with a gale. She rounded Sable Island, then headed up to St. Pierre bank, and with gale and frost was iced fore and aft a foot thick on decks and rigging. Heavy snow continued and yesterday evening she was off Cape Race, but could not beat along. Seas flooded her but she stood the strain well and was ably handled. She has 1000 tons of coal for Harvey & Co.

The special in charge of Conductor Hibbert left last night for Georgetown with N. S. mails and passengers. Those going down included Miss Cassie McDonald, Georgetown; John McNevin to Blaine, Wash.; Miss Harry Williams, near Miss Logan, to Moncton; Samuel Gayard and Reaney Jay; Miss Brace; J. A. Roule and wife to Quebec; T. E. Girvan of Emerson & Fisher, St. John; J. R. LeBlanc of the Lang M'ing. Co. Montreal; C. W. Farrand of the Canadian Drug Co. St. John; G. W. Parsons of Brayley, Thompson & Co. Toronto; Thos Harem, Quebec; the commercial men having been detained here for some weeks.

MUCH work was done on opening the railway line during the past few days and great credit is due to the men for their hard work. Cond. Hibbert left the city Saturday morning and cleared the road from Mt. Stewart to Georgetown reaching there about 6:30 and returning to the city with Stanley passengers, Cond. Gillis has the Cape Traverse branch all opened. Cond. Cox coming east is a mile west of St. Peters and Cond. Martin was approaching English last night. Cond. McKenna is at Grandhams and Cond. McDonald who Saturday relieved Cond. Kelly is at North Wiltshire. They will work together today.

THE C. B. C. Debating Society met at 7:30 Saturday evening and adjourned to participate in a social proposed by the committee. Various games had been provided and were eagerly indulged in. There were several readings which added considerably to the pleasure of the evening. About 10:30 a vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Miller for the loan of the rooms, and after singing Auld Lang Syne and the National Anthem the students and friends departed.
