HISTORIAN PREDICTS BOOM FOR CANADA

BOSTON, Feb. 20.—Canada will benefit greatly eventually because of the war in Europe in which it is participating as a part of the British Empire, and it has a wonderful future as a country well as a glorious past. This is the opinion of James H. Stark of Boston, author of "The Loyalists of Massachusetts," a book which created a great stir when published a few years ago. Mr. Stark is a prominent resident of Dorchester and has been a historian of the colonial period has had a conspicuous part in several organizations in this vicinity. He was formerly president of the British Charitable Society of Boston, was one of the founders of the Dorchester Historical Society and also of the South Boston Yacht Club. There are few men in this country who are better known to Canadian loyalists. He is well versed in the history of Canada and a great admirer of that country. He was born in England. "Fifty years ago," said Mr. Stark, "Canada consisted of a few scattered provinces. It has now widened into a vast country with its East and West seaboard 3,500 miles apart, between whose waters lie nine organized provinces, joined by splendid lines of communication with all the stir and tension of development. 200,000 IMMIGRANTS. "Last year more than 200,000 immigrants sought homes in Canada from the United States. In Canada they found all the freedom they had enjoyed in their old homes, and a good deal more. They soon found how hollow is the rant about the oppression of John Bull. "They found that the British system is far more democratic than that of the United States, in that it defers more readily to the will of the people than the republican plan does. "Canada is in industrial development has made rapid strides in variety and volume, and it will soon become the granary of the British Empire. "This war has knit Canada closer to the United Kingdom and other parts of the Empire than anything in its history. It has united all Canadians, irrespective of ancestry. The French Canadians are as patriotic in their regard for the Empire as are their fellow subjects of British descent. "The only thing which Canadians of all political parties disagree on is the Dominion was not able, because of party differences existing before the great struggle began, to furnish the Empire its quota of warships. "All Canadian political parties regret now that a way was not found for the Dominion to keep its pledge as other colonies did. It was the Australian cruiser Sydney which sank the German cruiser Emden, a glorious feat of arms for a country which had just provided itself and assisted the motherland with a navy. "Canada has already sent to England many thousands of its sons to fight for the Empire. Out of a population of about 3,000,000, I believe that the Dominion before the war is over will furnish 250,000 soldiers for the defence of world freedom against German militarism and oppression. "This will be a grand showing and will awaken everybody in the United Kingdom to the fact that Canadians are as loyal to King and country as the people of any other colony. The world will realize when this war is over that Canada is the most important of the Empire's overseas dominions. "A better understanding and realization of the loyalty of Canada before at the time of the boer war. But there was not the same unanimity in the Dominion as to that struggle as there is regarding this one. It has knit all English-speaking people in closer bonds. MORE IMMIGRATION. "After the war Canada will benefit by greatly increased immigration from the British Isles. It not only has a great industrial future but a larger part of its area of 3,729,665 square miles is as good wheat land as there is on earth. "The new lines of the railroads which insure its speedy development. Within twenty-five years I believe Canada will have a population of 25,000,000. Within twenty years its railway mileage has expanded from little more than 15,000 to nearly 30,000 miles. During that period the foreign trade of the Dominion has more than quadrupled and domestic trade has expanded in proportion. "It has become the home of a great and free people. It is a free nation within the greatest empire, and it is destined to have the most robust population on this continent. Physically the Canadians already surpass all other peoples in America. That is natural because they are northernmost. SISTER NATIONS. "In their relations Canada and the United States have become sister nations. With its enormous natural wealth and with a population of surpassing vigor and energy, the Dominion has already reached a high state of development. It is no longer a little remnant upon the borders of the United States. "No longer does this country draw from Canada its ambitious, enterprising youth. There are better opportunities for Canadians at home. There are as good wages there and everything else which appeals to those who seek to better themselves by leaving home. "The Canadian Northwest is a region where everything is possible to

brains and brawn. The trend of population has changed. For many years the United States drew from the population of the British Provinces on its north. "Now Canada is drawing from the best farming population of this country. Both movements have strengthened the ties of friendship, kinship and mutual interest. TAKE WARM INTEREST. "Boston and New England should take the warmest, friendliest interest in Canada and the Canadians. There are thousands of Canadian families whose ancestors left this country after it became the United States because proscribed and harried; they were loyal to the British crown, even at the cost of all their property and the surrender of dearest ties. "When the British evacuated Boston on March 17, 1776, there were conveyed to Halifax by Admiral Howe's fleet 927 fathers, mothers and children from the Massachusetts colony. Out of New York later went 3,000. The latter landed at the mouth of the St. John river in New Brunswick and founded in a day the city of St. John, in that Province. "There are few events in human history more striking than that settlement. Prior to the settlement of Canada by American refugees there was perhaps not more than 1,500 British people in all the vast area of what is now Dominion. In all it is estimated that 60,000 Americans left this country for Canada after the war of the Revolution. "Most of these loyalists left all they possessed behind in a land which spurned them because they preferred to remain British and held at any cost to their fealty to their king. PROVED CONSTANCY. "They proved their constancy and courage, fit attributes of a people for the founding of a great nation in a vast wilderness. "The descendants of these refugees are the bone, the brain and sinew of Canada today. Their forefathers did their share to develop the American colonies before they were driven from them, and the oldest States in the American Union were in their infancy as much indebted to these men and women as to any of the men who led and fought for independence. "But time has swept away all bitterness and rancour. Side by side, Canada and the United States are moving forward in peace and harmony towards a great and prosperous place among the nations of the earth. "Not since the War of 1812 have these kindred people clashed. It may be interesting for Bostonians to know that it was a Boston boy who won for the British arms the battle of Queenstown Heights, a victory which prevented Toronto from being captured by Americans. "This Boston boy was Sir Roger Sheaffe. When a child he lived with his widowed mother in a house at the corner of Essex and Columbia streets in Boston. SHEAFFE'S BOYHOOD. "There Earl Percy boarded when in Boston with General Gage's British at the battle of Queenstown Heights. When General Brome was mortally wounded by an American bullet, it was Sir Roger who led his troops to a victorious attack that held for the empire that vast domain won for it by General Wolfe on the heights of Quebec in a war when Americans bravely and loyally fought to keep North America a British land and to perpetuate forever on these shores British freedom and institutions.

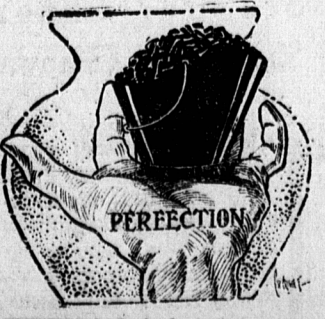
