HUGHES WAR RESOLUTION WITHDRAWN

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.-Warm discussion of the Hughes war resolution was followed by its withdrawal this evening in the Senate by its sponsor. The debate brought into action Mr. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Senator Leader, Hon. James Murdock (Lib. Ontario), Senator John Lewis (Lib. Ontario), General W. A. Griesbach (Cons. Edmonton), Senator H. S. Beland (Lib. Montreal) and Senator J. J. Hughes (Lib. Prince Edward Island).

The resolution proposed, if Canada ever again entered war, she would wage it "with every ounce of her strength in man and national power" and that declaration of war should be followed immediately by mobilization and conscription of all the human power and all the material wealth of the nation. It advocated further establishment of a war council composed of representatives of provinces and Dominion with power to the council to assign men and women to their best qualified occupations; no person in Canada to receive more than "the common soldier's" no war loans and all war costs to be raised by capital levy and taxation.

The resolution proposed, if Canada ever again entered war, she would wage it "with every ounce of her strength in man and national power" and that declaration of war should be followed immediately by mobilization and conscription of all the human power and all the material wealth of the nation. It advocated further establishment of a war council composed of representatives of provinces and Dominion with power to the council to assign men and women to their best qualified occupations; no person in Canada to receive more than "the common soldier's" no war loans and all war costs to be raised by capital levy and taxation.

"When we started 'The American Spectator,'" the editors said, "we told you that our purpose was simply to entertain ourselves and we hoped, our readers, and we told you that when and if we got tired of the job we would, as we expressed it, retire to our estates."

Pepper Gamble Causes Failure

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.-Bank of Canada officials revealed today they plan to issue a complete description of the institution's new notes before the bank opens for business, probably Mar. 11. They said the description would be issued to prevent confusion in the minds of the people and to discourage any attempts at counterfeiting.

By the time the bank opens the new Bank of Canada notes will be ready for distribution and immediately thereafter the chartered banks will be required to hand over their gold reserves to the central institution, involving a \$35,000,000 transaction on a basis of \$20.67 per ounce.

The chartered banks will receive only the nominal rate of \$20.67 per ounce for their holdings, and the Government of Canada. The present world price is around \$35 per ounce. Transfer of the gold from the chartered banks to the vaults of the Bank of Canada will be carried out by the Federal Government and will be surrounded with the usual security that features the continual handling of gold at the mint here.

Premier MacDonald Defends Regime

DONCASTER, Yorkshire, England, Feb. 27.-Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald said here tonight he will resign whenever he feels he can no longer "pull my full weight in the boat."

Defending himself and his National Government against its critics, the Prime Minister said: "So far as I'm concerned, I hold the position I do at the wish of my colleagues."

"When the moment comes that they find my services too dearly bought, or when I myself for one reason or another—and unfortunately there are many—am no longer satisfied that I can pull my full weight in the boat, I shall require nobody's advice to make up my mind what my duty is."
