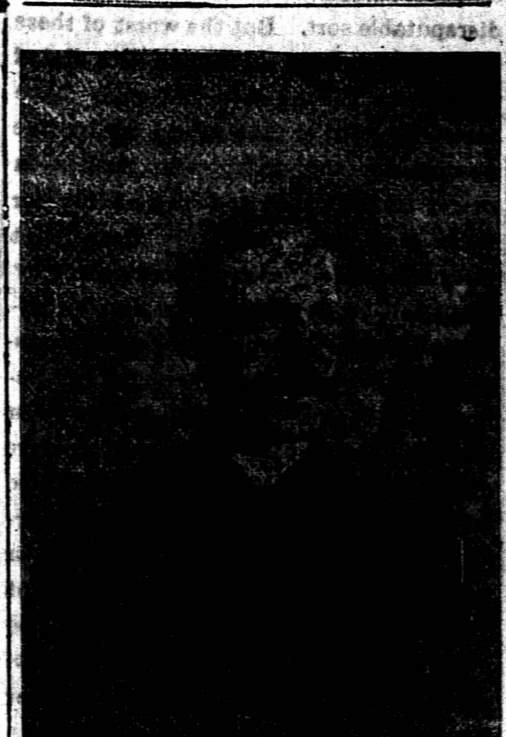

**A JUDGE WHO CAME TO CANADA WHERE ARE NO LYNCHINGS**

MILWAUKEE, Wis., July 15.—Every man who participates in the lynching or burning of a negro is a murderer pure and simple.

This opinion was given by Associate Justice David G. Brewer of the supreme court of the United States who is in the city on private business.

"Of course," explained Judge Brewer, "there may be extension which might vary the degree of the crime,

but the principal participants in the crime can be held by any court in the land for murder in the same degree as if the crime were committed by an individual.

"There is going to be a reaction against the atrocious crimes with which the papers have been filled. I cannot say what form it will take, but there will be an uprising of popular feeling against lynching that will result in legislation or a remedy of some other form."

**PROF. CAMPBELL FINDS A COMET HE OBSERVES ITS BRILLIANCY**

SAN JOSE, Calif., July 15.—Prof. W. W. Campbell of Lick observatory says: "The comet discovered by Mr. Borell of Marselles three weeks ago has been under observation by various members of the Lick observatory and promises to be an unusually interesting object. Its brightness has increased very rapidly until it is now as easily visible as a fourth magnitude star."
