G.W.V.A. Confident Of Good Success

OTTAWA, Sept. 30.—G. W. V. A. representatives here are confident that the progress of their negotiations with the parliamentary committee augurs well for the returned man. They believe that already the majority of the committee are convinced the present re-establishment system is wholly insufficient to give the veteran a fair start in civilian life. A government caucus which held up the proceedings this morning afforded respite for the G. W. V. A. watch dogs to review developments though they are wary not to talk too freely to newspaper representatives. The evidence of the various government departments in the committee has proved our case. Stated Comrade Boake of the Calgary G. W. V. A. who drew up the Calgary motion calling for a \$2,000 bonus. He is one of the G. W. V. A. advisory committee jointly working with the re-establishment.
