Six Goal Splurge In Final Period Gives City Squad 10-3 Victory Over Soviets

Smashing through for six goals in the third period, Charlottetown Rangers Saturday night won the Island junior hockey title from Summerside Soviets when they defeated the western titlists 10-3 in the "sudden death" game played at the Crystal Rink. The Rangers now meet Amherst St. Pats in the Maritime finals, the first game of which takes place tonight at Amherst.

Jumping into a 4-1 lead in the first twenty minutes of play as passing attacks carried them into scoring position repeatedly, Rangers were caught by the losers' second period counter-attack that netted the westerners two goals and brought them to within one counter of their opponents.

But a tiring Summerside squad was no match for the Rangers in the final session. For 10 minutes of the period they kept pressing determinedly for the tying counter but it was the Rangers that finally took control of the play and in the last half of the period swarmed all over their opponents. Golden Miller Favorite In Turf Classic

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) LIVERPOOL, England, March 14—About 300 enduring and experienced steeplechase horses and riders will start out Friday afternoon for the 4 1/2-mile test of luck, strength and skill known as the Grand National Steeplechase.

Approximately 100,000 people will gather at the Aintree course to watch the running of what is considered the world's most difficult jumping race.

As a race, the Grand National is one of the oddest and most exciting of all. Over a course including some jumps that never fail to take their toll, and tricky corners, it's an event in which any horse able to keep his feet may win. Sharing interest with the race itself are the huge sums given out in the sweepstakes, tickets for which find their way over the entire world.

The favorite likely will be Dorothy Page's 10-year-old gelding, Golden Miller, making his fifth attempt to win the steeplechase classic. The Miller, which has performed brilliantly in trials, won in 1934 but refused once, fell once and lost his jockey once in other previous starts. Until recently Lloyd Thomas' Royal Mail was rated favorite, but was ousted by Golden Miller after several poor trials. Vivian Smith's Ready Cash, another well-liked horse, suffered a training injury.

Among other outstanding entries are Sir David Llewellyn's Ego and P. Thrale's Crown Prince, second and fourth last year but far behind the winning Reynoldstown, which was not named for another trial.

Lottery Draw Today

DUBLIN, March 14—(AP)—Last preparations were made today for stakes.

From whirling drums of ticket stubs, carrying the hopes of thousands of ticket-holders throughout the world, the lucky one will be drawn tomorrow in ceremonies outside historic Mansion House.

The lottery is based on the Grand National, the world's classic steeplechase, to be run at Aintree March 19 in the presence of the King and Queen and scores of notables.

Holders of tickets on horses finishing one, two, three in the race will receive prizes of \$150,000, \$75,000, and \$50,000, respectively, while speculators whose tickets draw a horse will receive a minimum of \$3,000 each—even though the horse is scratched before the race.

MONTREAL, March 14—Montreal Victorias were declared junior hockey champions of Quebec today after defeating Quebec City Beavers 10-2 in the opener of what was to have been a two-game total-goal series. The Quebec Amateur Hockey Association decided the lopsided score made a second game unnecessary.
