CHURCH UNION IS OPPOSED

TORONTO, Sept. 27.—Prospect of a legal fight in the Presbyterian Church before Church Union can be brought about was predicted on Saturday by Principal Fraser of Montreal, who was in the city in connection with the draft legislation which came before a joint committee, on church union.
Principal Fraser is one of the strongest opponents to Church union—and he pointed out that there are big difficulties in the way. Some provision he declared must be made to take care of those who do not want union. The separation he felt is inevitable.
"The Presbyterian committee," he added, "is only a representative committee appointed to explore the whole legal situation. The matter is now in the hands of the Presbyterian association's lawyers and we may expect a big fight. Each side will look out for its own privileges. The Presbyterian committee was not able to do anything final. I think the majority present at the joint conference were prepared to step into union at any cost."
Prof. A. T. Lang, who is one of the anti-unionists, added reports, a gradual improvement in the intercourse of nations and an even larger interest in the cause of world peace. He referred to the treatment of the present difficulties in the Near East as an illustration, and expressed a belief that an educated public opinion throughout the empire would have a moral effect upon disturbing elements that should go far towards maintaining stabilized conditions.

EVANGELISTIC CAMPAIGN

TORONTO, Sept. 27.—The Methodist Church in Canada, it is announced, will shortly launch a big evangelistic campaign, not of the camp meeting order but on the lines in vogue at the early days of Methodism, when little groups assembled to study the life of Christ. The department of evangelism and social service is promoting the campaign, which will be launched all over the Dominion. It may last seven to 10 days or two weeks or even longer, in each place. Not more than 14 persons are wanted in one group. Nine are preferred. The idea is to get a few people who are really interested in Christ and the life He lived and who want to study that life — to get them in close touch where they can voice their feelings and feel free to express them selves as they might not in a large gathering.
Rev. T. Aybert Moore, who heads the evangelism department, has seen a circular letter to the clergy and many of the lay leaders outlining the new plan of campaign, and Dr. Moore gives the glimpse of the modus operandi:
A syllabus is provided which involves personal study and group effort. No lectures are given, and no particular theological view is promoted. The group itself works out some definite and vivid conception of Jesus.
