THE WAR SITUATION.

So far the Boers have been beaten in every engagement with the British in which the numbers were approximately equal, and frequently they have been whipped where they outnumbered the British two or three to one. They have shown a fair measure of cunning, but they allowed General Buller to escape from Glencoe when with the overwhelming force at their disposal they might easily have cut off his retreat and crushed him.

The one strong Boer force is surrounding Ladysmith, and the balance of their troops are scattered from Rhodesia to Stormberg over a circle of many hundreds of miles. It will thus be quite impossible for them to concentrate a sufficient force to oppose General Buller's advance through the Orange State when he is ready to move. Joubert has apparently staked the issue of the campaign on his ability to capture General White with his army, guns and stores in Ladysmith which it would not appear he is likely to effect.

So far all the siege operations of the Boer commanders have failed. Making and Kimberly are holding out. Then there are the Boer losses to be taken into account, which altogether in killed, wounded and prisoners can hardly be less than 5,000 men, which decimates their boasted force of 50,000. Where every able-bodied man is already under arms there can be no prospect of reinforcements for the Boer armies.

Nor can they obtain additional guns or munitions, for their country is surrounded and all its gateways watched by Britain's soldiers and fleets. From this time forward, unless they win some signal success in the field, the Boer troops must suffer the depression which follows upon being unable to fight their enemy man to man, while that enemy is able to bring into the field ever increasing numbers, and more and more effective artillery.

The news of the recapture of Colenso gives hope that with the reinforcements now arriving the railway line to Ladysmith may be opened and kept open. This is important as apparently the supply of ammunition for the naval guns at Ladysmith is limited and might become exhausted if the siege were prolonged. Other features of the war news may be said to be generally favorable.
