SHIPPING NEWS

MANY STEAMERS IN DISTRESS SUNK U. S. SHIP BY SHELLFIRE

The American Shipping Board steamer Mame, aboard which an explosion Saturday afternoon caused a fire which ignited the oil bunkers, was sunk Tuesday by shells fired into her by submarines stationed at Cristobal.

At the time of the explosion the Mame was on a voyage from New York to Melbourne with an 8,000 ton cargo of general merchandise.

CONGESTION AT PORT OF ST. JOHN

No definite combining action has so far been taken by Montreal transportation companies in connection with the congestion in the port of St. John, N. B., where ships are said to be waiting for their turn to get a berth, in what resembles queues at the theatres. The delays of late have been so serious that threats have been uttered here in the past of at least two important shipping lines that their next ships will be brought in to Portland, or Boston. IN MEMORIAM

GUNNER GEORGE CARVER

Many citizens heard with regret yesterday of the death in the Rena McLean Memorial Hospital of Gunner George Carver aged 26 years son of Mr. George J. Carver of this city. Deceased was a member of the 12th Canadian Siege Battery and served two years with that unit in France, until he contracted pleurisy with pneumonia supervening and underwent several operations both in France and England.

He was one of a large number of hospital cases which returned to Canada from overseas via Portland Me., in a hospital ship in May 1919. He entered Camp Hill Hospital, Halifax and was under treatment there until November last when he was transferred to the hospital in Charlottetown, where despite all that was done he gradually grew weaker until death came to his relief. He was fully conscious to the end and was quite resigned to the fact that his young life was drawing to its close. He had an excellent record as a soldier and was very popular with his comrades. Before going overseas he worked at the trade of barbering in this city. He leaves to mourn a widow, formerly Miss Croken of Emer-ald, to whom he was married one week before going overseas, his father, two brothers, Walter Ernest, who also served in France with the 2nd Heavy Battery and John Alexander, who fought in the 26th Battalion; also his stepmother and three half brothers and three half sisters.
