Proceedings in Provincial Legislature

(Continued from page four)
of his position to pursue official papers which might prejudice the case of the Province.
MR. JOHNSTON said it was not he who asked for the papers.
THE PREMIER said the papers had been called for and Mr. Johnston had on his own admission obtained access to them to further the case which he was threatening against the Province.
MR. JOHNSTON said that the House as a representative of the Province, whose interests he was bound to further and protect, and presuming upon that position to gain access to official information to use to the prejudice of the Province. It was contrary to all rules that or any other officer of the Province, that he as a representative of the people in that House, should as the attorney for an outside party, utilize his position to extract information to be used against the Province. He had also attempted to examine Mr. McLeod on the accuracy of the information he had in his possession, and was utilizing the privileges of that House, in order to argue the merits of the case which he might bring before the courts of this Province. He maintained that the proceedings were entirely irregular, out of order, and prejudicial to the interests of the Province. Mr. Johnston was elected to represent the interests of the people and he was endeavouring by misquoting and misconstruing information obtained from the Government in his capacity as a representative of the people and making incorrect statements to prejudice the interests of the people in the event of the case coming before a jury. He was doing an injury to the Province itself, and was pursuing a course which was condemned by every rule and principle of the Legislature.
MR. JOHNSTON said he did not intend to argue the matter, and as it was then six o'clock the House adjourned till eight o'clock.
At the evening session there was a crowded attendance. Mr. Johnston concluded his speech and was followed by Hon. A. E. Arsenault who delivered a very able and convincing speech. Mr. Hughes was replying to this when he fell foul of the Speaker through charging that the Imperial hay purchases were a million dollars. The Premier advised the hon. member to be careful of his language, and as Mr. Hughes did not take the hint, the Premier ordered that the language be taken down. The Clerk took down the language, and the Premier then moved the adjournment of the House in order to give Mr. Hughes an opportunity to put himself right.
The House was adjourned till 10 a. m. Wednesday.
WEDNESDAY, APRIL 18
The House resumed at 11.30 a. m. Mr. Speaker Martin in the Chair. A half an hour was occupied discussing the Journal of the House when the question of order raised the previous night was discussed in camera.
When the House resumed in public Mr. Howatt presented a petition from William A. Muttart praying for an act to change his name to Fred Muttart. A bill was subsequently introduced and read a first time.
Hon. A. E. ARSENAULT presented a petition to incorporate Egmont Bay and Mt. Carmel Telephone Co., Ltd., and a bill was introduced and read a first time.
MR. PATON presented a petition from the Mayor and Councilors of the City of Charlottetown praying for an act to further amend the Charlottetown Waterworks and Sewerage Act, and a bill was subsequently read a first time.
Hon. A. E. ARSENAULT presented a petition and subsequently introduced a bill to incorporate the Prince Edward Island Brick and Tile Co., Ltd.
A number of questions were asked and answered.
MR. HUGHES resumed his speech on the budget. He said he had been dealing with the hay contracts when he was interrupted last night, and he wanted to show that the farmers were not receiving the same amount for
