Appreciation of Retiring Pastor

SACKVILLE, N. B., March 10 — At the recent annual business meeting of the Sackville United Church, the pastor, Rev. Geo. Morris, B. A. B. E., presented his resignation. Mr. Morris stated that he had noticed in looking over the long record of the church that there was a tradition of short pastorate. The average term with few exceptions was less than three years. As he will have completed four years of service at the end of the Conference year, he felt that the best interests of all would be served by a change of pastoral relationships.

After consideration Mr. Morris's resignation was accepted and the following minute was ordered inscribed upon the records: —

"As we face the severing of the pastoral relation at the end of June, we are fully conscious of the devoted service that has been given by you and Mrs. Morris during the last four years. You have been a true pastor in your visiting, especially in your unwavering and faithful attendance upon the sick and the shut-in. You have revived Young People's work in the Church and have been faithful in the ministrations of the Word. We shall always think of you as our friend, and as a Christian leader of more than usual education and ability.

To Mrs. Morris we would express our sincerest and affectionate appreciation. In her leadership in the Women's Missionary Society and in her quiet helpfulness in the Ladies Aid she has won a place in the esteem and affection of the congregation.

Our sincerest good wishes and prayer for your success in the Master's work will go with you and your family to whatever field God in His Providence may call you."

Mr. Morris has made many friends during his stay in Sackville. One of the notable things of his ministry has been the strong feeling of friendship and co-operation between the United Church and other denominations in the town. Wherever Mr. Morris and his family may be called they will be followed by the kindly interest and good wishes of the Sackville people generally.
