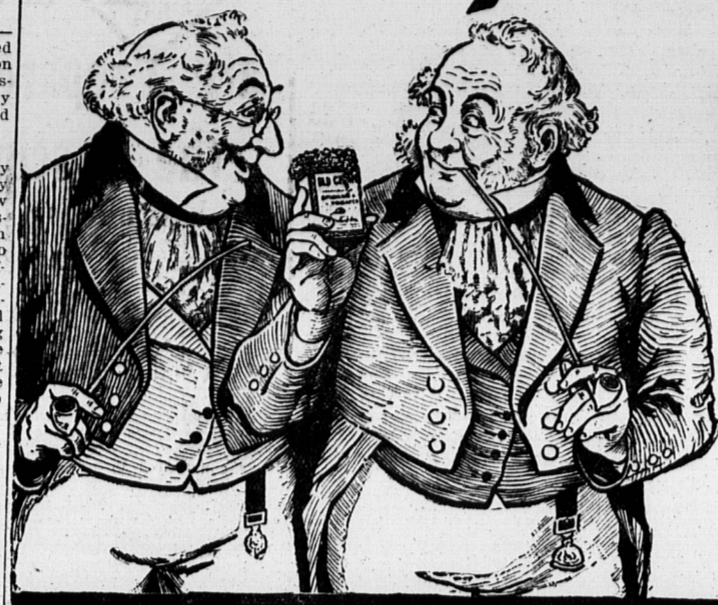

Young Bandit's Short Career

CHICAGO, May 15.—In four hours today Horace T. Walton, 22 years old, stole \$75,000 in cash, killed a policeman, barricaded himself in his apartment, held 50 detectives at bay in a pistol battle in which one was seriously wounded, and died with a bullet in his heart. Walton held up the mail car of the North Limited on the Illinois Central Railroad last night as the train was leaving Kankakee, Ill. Federal officers tonight were investigating the disappearance of \$50,000 from the satchel in which the robber carried away his loot. The \$75,000 was on its way to a Chicago bond house from the Citizens' National Bank of Decatur, Illinois. The officers, who counted the money after the satchel had been recovered, said the total was \$69,980, mostly in packages of \$5,000. The \$20 lacking from the \$70,000 recovered was given to Oscar Bloomquist, a clerk on the mail car, by the robber in payment for

left Mexico City several days ago to return to Vera Cruz.

Walton was identified as a former mail clerk of previously good character by C. W. Sims, an officer of the Chicago Young Men's Association. Mr. Sims told the police he received a letter from Mrs. L. U. Walton, of St. Joseph, stating that her son left home three weeks ago and was believed to be in Chicago. Walton was a high school graduate and a member of the Y. M. C. A., according to word from St. Joseph. His father was said to be on his way to Chicago to claim the body. Walton boarded the train at Gillman, a few miles from Kankakee, held up five clerks in the mail car, the first stop in Chicago. When rifled the car and left the train at the first stop in Chicago. When two policemen questioned him he opened fire, wounding Patrolman William A. Roberts, who died later at a hospital. Later Walton was finally surrounded at his rooming place, and was killed in the fight that followed.

Signor Meda, reports said, was expected to decline a tentative invitation to form a new cabinet. Nitti probably will form a new cabinet including media and other Catholics, it was believed.

U. S. to Plant Fewer Potatoes

(Special to The Guardian.) WASHINGTON.—Farmers contemplate planting five percent less acreage in potatoes this year than last, according to an announcement of the department of agriculture today. Reports came through field agents who recently questioned growers in important producing states. Potatoes now are one of the highest priced commodities on the market. The high price of potato seed and the shortage of farm labor are two reasons given for the reduction in acreage.

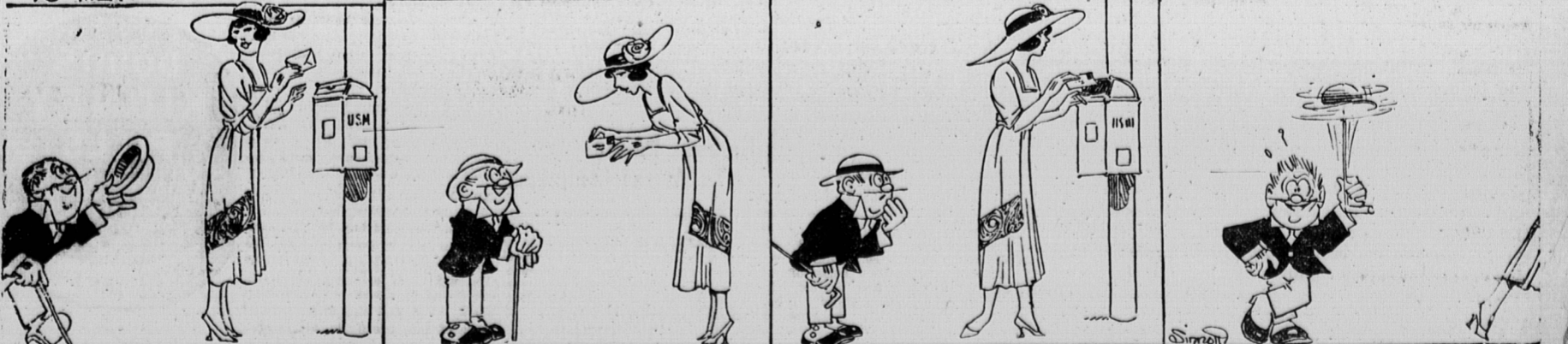
