RUSSIAN MAIN OFFENSIVE BY WAY OF GALECIA AND TOWARD BRESLAU

(By Ed. L. Keen, United Press Staff Correspondent.)

LONDON, Oct. 2.—That the present battle line of the Aisne River, crossing France and sweeping south along the Vosges into Lorraine, was selected long ago by one German General Staff in anticipation of just the situation that at present exists, is the opinion of General Sir John French and his staff. The stubborn resistance is attributed to this fact. The War Bureau to-day gave out an addition to last night's report from the front, this one dealing with the operations of September 23 and 24. It confirmed the impression that the present battle more closely resembles a siege than anything else at the time the report was written.

BATTLE IS A SIEGE.

"The operations of the 24th and 25th found a resemblance to a general siege in every movement against the German positions. Naturally the chief reason is the fact that the enemy is most strongly entrenched and his army is equipped with plenty of heavy artillery, all well mounted. It is very plain from observations by the British aerial corps that this position was not selected by chance. In fact it is certain that the entrenchments are of an almost permanent nature. The enemy had sufficient time solidly to entrench himself more than half way across France, and the line along the Aisne had been put in condition before the battle of the Marne had entered its decisive phase by the German sappers.

"Because of this fact it is considered certain that its selection was not a haphazard one. Instead, the Germans knew just where they were going, and there are abundant evidences that the position actually was located by the German General Staff in anticipation of just what afterward happened."

GERMANS AGAIN SHIFT TROOPS.

Advices from the front in France indicate that the Germans are again shifting their troops. The Ninth German army, which is commanded by the General von Boehm and holds the extreme right of the German line, has again been reinforced. It is thus made plain to the military experts here that the Germans themselves realize the entire success of the present movement hinges on holding their right until the Meuse line of forts can be demolished by the bombardment now in progress. UNREST IN ALBANIA MAY GIVE ITALY CAUSE FOR WAR

Pot is Boiling Over Again in the Turbulent Balkan Principality, and Italy Whose Interests are Opposed to Austria's May Have to Act

LONDON, Oct. 2.—The pot is boiling over once more in Albania. The situation in the artificial principality became so serious today that intervention by Italy is not unlikely. There is no doubt that such intervention would mean a declaration of war by Austria.

Necessity for "protecting Italian interests in Albania" may furnish the pretext Italy openly desires for taking sides in the war of the nations. There is more than vague surmise to justify this conclusion. It is known that the new crisis in Albania is exercising the Italian Government and that positive action is contemplated.

In Durazzo, the Senate of Albania, defying all of the Powers, has elected Prince Burhan-Edin, a son of Abdul Hamid, deposed Sultan of Turkey, as Prince of Albania. The Senate appointed a commission to go to Constantinople and deliver the invitation to the Turkish Prince. Simultaneously Essad Pasha, the great popular leader in Albania, prepared to march on Durazzo with army of 12,000. He has arrived at Dibra with a force and is collecting an army for the overthrow of the Intergovernment.

There is more than a hint here that Essad is playing Italy's game, that his new revolt is not only a development of Italy's policy of obstructing Albanian nationality, but is meant to offer Italy an acceptable pretext for definitely intervening in Albanian affairs. If Austria, as formerly, musters strength to crush Essad, will Italy support the Mohammedan leader? Such action, it is believed here, could not fail to mean war.

GERMANY WARNS ROUMANIA.

BERLIN, Oct. 1.—The German ambassador at Bucharest held a lengthy conference with the Rumanian Cabinet today. It is understood here that he very frankly warned the Rumanian Government that any declaration of war or hostile act against Austria would of necessity involve Germany. It is also announced here that Turkey today expelled from Turkish territory all correspondents of Russian newspapers.

MISLEADING REPORTS BY OPPOSITION PRESS.

OTTAWA, Oct. 1.—Several Liberal organs in their anxiety to attack and if possible injure the government have asserted that the Australian and New Zealand contingents have not

ready arrived in Great Britain, and indeed have reached the front. The most recent and reliable advices from Great Britain indicate that these contingents have not yet embarked. These statements made in the journals above mentioned are absolutely unfounded and seem to have been made deliberately for the purpose of misleading the Canadian people.

FORESTS OF MOVING INDIAN TROOPS.

LONDON, Oct. 3.—Malcolm Macaskill writing from Marseilles, to The Daily Telegraph, describes the long-awaited arrival of the Indian troops. He says: "At last one morning they really did come. I was watching before dawn. It was not yet when the first line came around. Across the sea not yet turned to blue they stretched further and wider. They stirred as they came more than the waters in which they moved. As they came nearer we could make out their movements on the decks of one or two of the boats. For the most part the decks seemed to be deserted. Preparations for embarkation were already proceeding or else 'revellies' had not yet been sounded but one or two of the vessels huddled together under awnings, stretched to shelter the troops from the heat, there were veritable forests of forms moving.

They came to the ships side and looked toward land. In the brown host we made out above the turbans and the dark faces a British flag.

The ships picked up the pilots one by one and went sailing in.

Has the East ever sent to the West a richer argosy or one more dear? As the ships turned to enter the harbor there were cries of "Vive l'Angleterre" and "Vive Les Hindous" to which the far travellers added their lustiest "Heap, heap, hurrahs."

GERMAN ATTACK REPULSED.

PARIS, Oct. 3.—An official announcement issued this afternoon declares the violent attack of the Germans on Iloye, has been repulsed by the Allies.
