THE MAIN ESTIMATES WERE TABLED YESTERDAY

\$1,506,200 for P. E. I. Car Ferry and Railway. Summerside Gets \$13,000 for Repairs to Public Building. Large Increase for Agriculture.

(From Our Own Reporter) OTTAWA, Jan. 29.—The main estimates, which were tabled in the House to-night, total \$146,786,186 for ordinary expenditure, as compared with \$143,212,814 last year, or an increase of \$3,573,371. Capital expenditure for the year is estimated at \$48,949,050, as compared with \$59,443,351 last year or a decrease of \$10,494,301. The net decrease on total estimates of this year as compared with last year is \$11,920,990.

the two and a half years of the present Government's rule the appropriations for agriculture has been increased by no less than \$2,300,000, and to-day is not far from three times what it was in 1910-11. One of the largest votes is \$1,500,000 to provide for the P. E. I. car ferry, construct terminals and provide necessary connections. To increase the accommodation and facilities along the P. E. Island Line there is a vote of \$6,200 making a total vote of \$1,506,200. There is a vote of \$13,000 for the Summerside public building which includes a new roof and addition. There is \$3,000 for Tignish public building.

is nearing completion is shown by a decrease in the vote from nineteen millions last year to eight millions this year. For terminals and elevators of the Hudson Lias of railway there is a vote of four and a half millions. That the Welland Canal is to be actually pushed forward is shown by the vote of four millions. Two millions was the vote for this last year. There is a vote of three millions for the Quebec Bridge, and seven and a half millions for the Intercolonial Railway. Amongst the fisheries votes is an item of special interest being \$150,000 to assist in the conservation and development of deep sea fisheries and to provide for better transportation facilities for fresh fish. For the fisheries patrol service there is an increase in the vote of \$40,000. Among new votes is \$50,000 for inspection of canned fish. For oyster culture there is \$3,000.

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Jan. 29.—A delegation of Ontario millers met a large number of the M. P.'s to-day to discuss free wheat. It is contended that the only result of Canadian free wheat would be to give the Chicago speculators a greater number of seasons wherein to fill his contracts. The crux of the situation they held was in the reform of the Atlantic freight rates.

LIBERAL LEADER

WOMAN FOUND FROZEN IN THE ICE OF RIVER.

WINDSOR, Ont., Jan. 28.—With limbs protruding for perhaps a foot above the frozen surface, the rest of the body encased in solid ice, which completely hid it from view, the corpse of Mrs. Eleanor Baker, aged 45, wife of Charles H. Baker, of Detroit, was discovered in the lower Detroit river, a short distance out from the shore of Fighting Island, Sunday evening.

CONCLUSION OF ADDRESS DEBATE

(From Our Own Reporter) OTTAWA, Jan. 29.—The debate on the speech from the Throne was completed today, after having dragged along two weeks. By a majority of 45 the Free Wheat amendment of the Liberals and the House is now free to get down to work in earnest. That the Government is prepared to proceed with business is shown by the fact that no sooner was the vote over than Hon. George H. Perley, acting for the Minister of Finance, who is still indisposed, laid on the table of the House the main estimates.

SEVEN YEARS IN PENITENTIARY

(Canadian Press) WINNIPEG, Jan. 29.—Robert G. Reid, the police constable and guard of Kratzenko, who assisted him to escape was sentenced this morning to seven years in the penitentiary. In imposing sentence Police Magistrate Sir Hugh John Macdonald said: "I consider your offence exactly on a par with that of the sentry who deserts his post in the face of an enemy. By your actions you brought disgrace upon the whole force with which you were connected. You violated the oath you took. You perjured yourself before the Police Commission and before the Royal Commission investigating the affair. You aided in turning loose upon this community a most dangerous criminal and deliberately furnished him with a dangerous revolver knowing his dangerous character, and that the chances were that those most likely to fall victims to it were members of the force. I will not say you had murder in your heart when you did this, but I will say you were absolutely reckless of consequences."
