## STUART LEADING HOCKEYIST PAYS TRIBUTE PRODUCED IN MARITIMES TO RACE HORSE

He of the Sun Thatched Cranium, the Only And Original Bill Who Made Good With St. Pats and is Now Touted as One of The Most Valuable Puck Chasers in The National Hockey League.

A splendid tribute is paid William R. Stuart, he of the countless cognomens, by D. L. Dolan, in the Sydney Record. Bill's career is well known in Amherst, but reiteration of some of its salient points will bring back to recollection the days when thousands of fans would stand in the Arena seats, when Stuart started one of his end to end rushes. "Them were the days," Mr. Dolan in writing about "Gallilee Red" says I first saw William Roxborough Stuart, more familiarly known to hockey fans of Canada as "Red" back a few years ago when he came to Cape Breton with an Amherst team. He was then a mere youngster as a hockey player, but even though Amherst failed to create a great stir in local hockey circles, being badly defeated by the Cape Breton teams, Stuart was by far the most promising player of the lot.

In view of the place he has won for himself in the N. H. L., the foremost hockey organization in the world, Bill Stuart must be acclaimed the greatest hockey player of the Maritime Provinces ever produced. I don't think that I am going too far when I so characterize Bill Stuart. Today he is rated as one of the fastest defence men in hockey, and while toward the end of the past season he didn't shine with the same brilliancy that marked his efforts earlier in the winter, Stuart was nevertheless the outstanding performer on the St. Pats club of Toronto.

If I mistake not Stuart was the first player from the Maritime Provinces who ever went to the N. H. L. and made good from the very outset. Others have taken a crack at the N. H. L. but they never "came through" on the first trial. Lester Lowther, of Amherst did play with Toronto on his first trip to the big league but he didn't back there, while Rolie Norman another veteran from the Maritimes failed to stick, Stanton Jackson was let out in his first season with the St. Pats, but he did come back this winter and made good with a vengeance. Paddy Nolan and Ted Stackhouse failed to make the grade and Larry MacLean after performing with Quebec Bulldogs one winter didn't come back. So it is that Stuart, of all our hockeyists, past and present, must be accorded the laurel wreath for outstanding hockey ability.

Many players are perhaps better known for their work in the Maritimes than Bill Stuart, but none has gone so far in the class of hockey that holds the Amherst boy today. While he was in the Maritimes, Stuart did practically all his playing in and around Amherst. There was a fairy tale going the rounds a few years ago that Stuart hadn't learned to skate until he was well in his 'teens, but 'Scoop' Ross, of the Amherst News tells me that Stuart started to play hockey when he was attending the public school in Amherst and even as a school boy was an outstanding performer.

He broke into the game with the Victoria Athletic Club of that town an organization that included in its make-up, Gordon McLeod, who was perhaps the best goalie performing in the Maritime Provinces a year ago. Later Stuart joined the Amherst Ramblers, then an amateur organization and he figured on that club with such well known hockey stars as E. S. G. G. Lowther, John Chisholm, Hec Grimley and Bill's own brother, George, a veteran at the time the red thatched youth was just breaking into senior company.

When the Independent Hockey League came into existence, following the stringent ruling by the C. A. A. U. that put the quietus on the efforts of a number of veteran athletes of the Maritimes, Stuart made the jump to the pro ranks. With the Amherst Independents, Stuart soon became a star performer. In fact his work so attracted the N. H. L. scouts that Bill was finally induced to make the jump to the Toronto St. Pats and he went to the N. H. L. three winters ago.

## Harry H. Stokes Says He Will Make a Great Record.

ST. JOHN, April 1.—Following is a letter which has been received by Bert Lint from Harry H. Stokes, of Springfield, Ohio, regarding Chesley H. Searcy, 2,05 1-4, the new free for all pacer which Frederickton people have bought says the Frederickton Citizen. "I don't think there is a pacer in the United States that can be bought at that price that can beat him on any kind of track. He is as sound as a horse can be, the best headed, best gaited and has as much speed as any pacer has. (Canadian Press) LOSS ANGELES, April 1.—Jack Dempsey, heavyweight motion picture actor, late yesterday signed a \$1,000,000 contract calling for his appearance in ten films to be produced while he is waiting for some promoter to make Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight boxing champion an "attractive offer" for a fight some where on Labor Day. A telegraphic offer was received today, Jack Kearns said, from Tex Rickard, offering Dempsey a \$500,000 guarantee for his signature to a contract to meet the winner of the series of elimination bouts between Gibbons, Wills, Ermindo, Strala, Rojas and Firpo. Should Dempsey accept the bout will take place in New York, Labor Day, Kearns said.
