CHEESE BOARD.—There was no Cheese Board meeting yesterday. The cable message reads:—Sixteen hundred cheese boards, one thousand sold at twelve and seven-eighths; market strong. There will be no more meetings of the Board this season.

THE MARKETS.—The Charlottetown market was very brisk yesterday morning and the fine weather caused a record number of people to come to the city. Produce moved slowly. A number of loads of potatoes sold from 30 to 35 cents per bushel. Patridge were scarce and brought the extremely high price of 65 to 70 cents per pair, while geese \$1.00 to \$1.50 each and rabbits 35 to 40c. a pair. In all other cases business was moderate and prices remained the same as previously quoted.

ATHLETIC LEAGUES.—Arrangements are being made for a meeting of all people interested in the Athletic League of the churches to be held at the Y. M. C. It will be a lively social occasion and will mark the beginning of the winter activities of the League as well. The plans for a boys' basketball league and a bowling tournament by the men of the churches will also be made known. These activities were authorized at a meeting of the officers of the League held at the Y. M. C. A. Thursday evening. The basketball league will start its schedule of games as soon as the church teams are organized. The bowling tournament will likewise be started in the near future and it is expected that the sport will develop some keen, friendly rivalry. These tournaments will complete their schedule before the holidays. NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—The football season, short at the best, enters on its final stage tomorrow, and within the next three Saturdays the three big games of the season will be played—Harvard vs. Yale, Yale vs. Princeton and the Army vs. Navy. They are the biggest games, but not necessarily the most interesting, for the Pennsylvania-Cornell battle comes on Thanksgiving Day, and whatever the quality of the football in this game and the records of the

teams there is always lively action and variety.
The big game tomorrow will be the Harvard-Princeton contest at Princeton. Yale will take on Brown at New Haven and Pennsylvania will have the strong Dartmouth eleven as an opponent on Franklin Field. Another attractive item on the day's menu will be the inter-sectional battle at Ithaca between Cornell and Michigan.
