

Leafs Take Lead In N.H.L. By Blasting New York Rangers 8-6

NEW YORK, Nov. 18—(CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs stretching their winning streak to four games won a high-scoring National Hockey League game over New York Rangers 8-6 tonight and went into first place in the standing.

Centres Syl Apps and Pete Langelle each scored two goals to lead the Leafs to a well-deserved victory in a game in which they always held the edge in offensive play. Other successful marksmen for the visitors were Gordon Drillon, Dave Schriener, Bob Davidson and Lorne Carr, the recent acquisition from the Brooklyn Americans.

Lynn Patrick scored twice for the Rangers, who took their third straight defeat and were crowded out of a tie for fourth place by Boston Bruins who won at home against Americans. Norm Tustin and Grant Warwick, rookies, and veterans Nell and Mac Colville each scored one to complete the rout of the goals.

The game, played at a fast and wide open clip, was witnessed by a small crowd of 8,711 at Madison Square Garden.

Canadiens Seek Kerr?

TORONTO, Nov. 18—(Wednesday)—(CP)—The Globe and Mail in a sport page story today said that Dave Kerr, star N.H.L. goalkeeper now retired, is being sought by Montreal Canadiens and is expected to give his answer today. Kerr, a suburban Leaside, said that he has not yet reached a decision.

Kerr is still the property of the Rangers but now is working as a salesman here and is coaching a team in the Toronto City Hockey League.

The Globe and Mail said also that Harvey (Busher) Jackson, the hold-out list since refusing to accept salary cut from the Brooklyn Americans, is also involved in negotiations with an N.H.L. club but Jackson declined to talk.

Sydney abides By ruling Of C.A.H.A.

MIDLAND, Ont., Nov. 18—(CP)—George Dudley, President of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, announced today that defenceman Eddie Patzer will return to Yorkton, Sask., where he performed last year. Patzer now is in Sydney, N.S., where he had applied for a transfer to Sydney Millionaires of the Cape Breton League.

"Both Patzer and the Sydney club have called me by telephone and agreed to abide by the ruling whereby Patzer was to return to Yorkton or not play hockey," Dudley said.

"He'll have left for Yorkton by the end of the week and the Sydney club will pay his expenses to Port Arthur. That's where he left for Sydney after trying out with a professional team in fall training."

Since both Patzer and the Sydney club have agreed to abide by the C.A.H.A. ruling, no action will be taken against the Millionaires.

C.A.H.A. rulings state that a player who shifts from one place to another must be in his new place of residence by May 15. Patzer was not in Sydney before that deadline but an attempt was made to have him declared a military placement, under which clause no deadline exists for transfer.

However, under such action it is necessary that permission be granted from the player's former club. Yorkton refused to give Patzer his release and appealed to Dudley.

Italians arrest U. S. Pastor on Espionage suspicion

ROME, Nov. 18—(AP)—Italian police today arrested Rev. Hiran Woolf of Elmira, N. Y., rector of the famous St. Paul's American Episcopal Church in Rome, and held him incommunicado after informing United States Embassy officials that his case was being investigated "on suspicion of intelligence activity."

The minister, who formerly held pulpits in Dresden and Munich, Germany, was arrested in his rectory at 9:30 a.m., two days before he planned to conduct a Thanksgiving Day service at which he would have read President Roosevelt's annual Thanksgiving Day proclamation.

The United States Charge d'Affaires, George Wadsworth, called at the Foreign Ministry to inquire about the case and was told that the action was taken on the basis of "seriously incriminating information" having nothing to do with the pastor's church activities. The arrest was made on orders of the Ministry of the Interior, it was explained.

Wadsworth told officials that he knew Mr. Woolf well and knew nothing to indicate he had engaged in any intelligence activity. He asked to see him personally, wherever he is held, but it was intimated that this request would not be granted for several days.

The officials promised Wadsworth they would inform him when and if any charges were laid against the pastor.

Gay Lad, valuable saddle horse owned by Mr. Thomas N. Rogers of Charlottetown, died in the city yesterday morning after an illness of several weeks. Horse lovers throughout the province will regret to hear of the passing of this beautiful 9-year-old chestnut horse which has been a leading contender for top honors in the saddle and jumping classes at the annual Horse Show staged at the Provincial Exhibition Grounds each summer.

In 1938 Gay Lad was classed as the best saddle horse in the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition and the following night captured the championship of the show. He has always been a prominent winner at the Horse Show in Charlottetown and was seen in action here this past summer.

The horse was brought here from Montreal some years ago by Mr. Thomas Rogers and since then has been greatly admired by local horse fanciers.

His owner is a son of Mrs. George Rogers of this city, and is at present attending King's College, Halifax.

MONTREAL, Nov. 18—(CP)—The Detroit Red Wings line of Don Grosso, Eddie Wares and Syd Abel is still at the top of the National League individual scoring race, league statistics issued here today revealed.

Grosso added an assist during the week, Wares a goal, and Abel totals to bring their goal totals to three goals and three assists, Wares one goal and five assists and Abel two goals and four assists.

Three other players in the N.H.L. caught up with Grosso in goals scored as the Red Wings star remained stationary in that field. Bill Thoms of Chicago Hawks, Gordie Drillon and Sweeney Schriner of Toronto Leafs, brought their goal-scoring total to three to tie Grosso in the top berth.

Wares held on to his top spot in assists with five but running close seconds were Abel and Doug Bentley of the Black Hawks with four each.

Toronto's Gordie Drillon, remaining scoreless throughout last week, moved down from fourth place to sixth behind Toe Blake of Canadiens, fourth with five points, and Thoms, also with a five-point total.

Canadiens' Jack Forland and Detroit's Johnny Stewart took over the leading "bad men" spot with 12 minutes apiece.

Bruising Bruins Trample Brooklyn Americans 7-2

BOSTON, Nov. 18—(AP)—The red-named Brooklyn Americans affronted Boston Bruins their customary feeble opposition tonight, with the result that the Stanley Cup hockey champions pulled out a one-sided 7-2 victory before a slim crowd of 8,000 at the Boston Garden.

The Bruins had to overcome the Americans' early 2-1 lead before gaining their third straight victory in four nights.

After Roy Conacher opened the scoring during the fourth minute of play, rookie Bill Benson and Fred Thurier each rammed pucks through Frankie Brimsek, the Boston goalie, with the assistance of Mel (Sudden Death) Hill, who performed for the Bruins last season.

The second Brooklyn tally aroused the Bruins and three of them swarmed through the enemy defence and blasted the veteran Earl Robertson for six more tallies. Those registering twice were Bill Cowley, the league's highest scorer last season, Milt Schmidt and Bill (Flash) Hollett.
