Major Allan D. Connors, M. C., died from wounds, according to the casualty list on Friday morning. His next of kin is given as living in Chicago but "The News-Telegram" received word from Ottawa, Saturday, that the Major Collins in the local man of that name.

The jury's verdict was that death had been caused by injuries received while traveling in a hostile airship which was brought down by the anti-aircraft organization.
