"Dynamite" Is Packed With Many Thrills

"Sweethearts On Parade" Scores Hit At Capitol

CECIL B. DE MILLE'S FIRST TALKING PICTURE PROVES BIG HIT AT THE PRINCE EDWARD

Cecil B. De Mille is always spectacular and always surprising—and both spectacle and surprise are present in overflowing measure as "Dynamite" plays out its performance at the Prince Edward Theatre, where it opened yesterday for a three day's engagement.

This story gallops merrily from the haunts of luxury to the depths of a coal mine; from the bars of the "death" cell at State's Prison to a colorful Ladies' Field Day at a country club. The principal protagonists are Charles Bickford, a coal miner, and Conrad Nagel, Kay Johnson and Julia Faye, from what is termed "high society."

It would not be fair to tell the whole of what is a very exciting and unusual plot. Suffice it to say that the marriage of a society girl to a murderer on the eve of the hour of his execution is not the least of its thrills!

The acting honors are equally divided amongst the four leads. As for the direction, Cecil B. De Mille is himself once more. After a long period with religious plays he is back to the exotic material in which he scored such a conspicuous early success.

"Dynamite" is a big production and merits capacity audiences during its engagement.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 13.—Prices were generally unchanged on the produce and dairy markets here today. The butter market was slightly higher. Eastern townships no. 1 pasteurized creamery butter was quoted at 29 1-2 to 29 3-4 cents a pound. To retailers solids were 32 cents and prints 33 cents, while receipts totaled 201 boxes. On the cheese market, Ontario was 13 3-4 cents and Quebec 13 1-4 cents to 13 3-4 cents a pound. Receipts were 3,085 boxes. Prices on the egg market were unchanged less than earlier prices for new laid eggs were 56 cents a dozen. Receipts were 610 cases of which 400 were American eggs going through here for export. The potato market was unchanged. New Brunswick green mountains were 85 cents for 80 pound bags. Prince Edward Island potatoes were 85 cents for cobbles and 90 cents for mountains per 90 pound bag.

The spirit of the Holy Ghost has been given tonight provided those receiving it realize its importance. Make use of your lives said His Lordship and in doing so help others. Christ looked upon life as a great opportunity for doing good to others. Christ is still lifting up his people, so can you His Lordship then gave his text taken from the 1st verse of the 6th Chapter of St. Paul's 2nd Epistle to the Corinthians "We then as workers together with him." Do you realize what it means to be a laborer with God. You have got to work for the spread of God's Kingdom and the uplifting of his people, you can do so by the power of God. You have to night come and been confirmed, and are now strong in the strength which God supplies through His Eternal Spirit. Urged that the gift be remembered and made use of and lifted high, so that all may see it and be encouraged through your strength and go forth as helpers and laborers in Christ Jesus.
