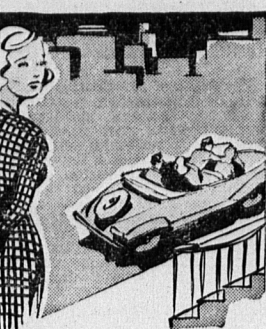

The purpose of the survey is being carried out to ascertain the suitability of the rock structure of the province for the production of oil. The work was commenced last year by the Corporation for the Clares Service Oil Company of New York.

WET WEATHER DANGEROUS TO "SPUDS"—Heavy rain between now and harvesting time would be dangerous to the potato crops of the province, it was stated last night by Mr. S. G. Peppin in charge of seed potato inspection. He explained that the potato crop is now ready to be planted and that the use of a little green leaf continuing to spray with beneficial results. Mr. Peppin said, however, a number of fields are being already and that some of them suffered a touch of frost. The field inspection of the "spuds" has been completed and the next step will be to start after digging. It is expected that farmers will not start harvesting the potatoes at any great scale until early next month.
