RAYMOND BROWN
Died September 19, 1935.

On Thursday, September 19th the angel of death dropped down in his night and claimed for his own the soul of Raymond Brown of Richmond. Friends far and near mourned when they heard of his passing through the faith which never failed to console him and in the bosom of which he went forth fearlessly to meet his Maker.

"Whatever is, is best" was the belief in which he lived and firm in the conviction that his sufferings came from God it never occurred to him to probe into the mysteries of God's providence, but he unquestioningly accepted his lot and lived a life that all men might imitate.

"They also serve who only stand and wait" and who knows but the spirit in which he bore his sufferings and the example he set for others was more pleasing to God than the noblest work which he might have accomplished.

The humility of his bearing and conversation gave no true indication of the brilliancy of his mind and it was perhaps only his intimate friends who realized the true extent of his nobility. He will live long in the memory of his friends and never a sign of regret that his passing should have come so soon when they faint would have him linger.

But rather should they rejoice for him that his long fight is over and today he is resting his reward. Let us cherish his memory as he would have us.

C.N.R. Week-End Excursions

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 11.—Two choice bargain fare excursions are being offered to the people of the Maritimes to visit relatives and friends and to some sight seeing.

One to Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto, including also Quebec City and Three Rivers, leaving on Friday, October 18th next, from stations in the province of Quebec east to Riviere Du Loup and Monk, including the Gaspé Peninsula, in addition to stations in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. The other excursion will be operated to Boston and New York, leaving the following week on Friday, October 25th, and will mark the first occasion on which one of these popular coach excursions has been operated from the Maritimes to take in New York City.

It is anticipated many will take advantage of the low fares offering to see the metropolises of the new world where there is so much to attract the visitor. The tallest building in the world (the Empire State Building) along with other skyscrapers, Radio City the numerous public buildings, the theatres, and other places of interest.

A generous return limit has been allowed on both coach excursions. In the case of Montreal and Ottawa, including Quebec City and Three Rivers, tickets are good to return leaving those cities the following Tuesday, October 22nd, and Toronto Wednesday, October 23rd; for the Boston and New York excursions tickets will be good to return, leaving Boston not later than special train, departing at 9:30 P. M. E.S.T. the following Tuesday, October 29th, and from New York Wednesday, Oct. 30th.
