THE CHARLOTTETOWN RACES

A Big Event in Charlottetown.

The time for the closing of the entries for the races advertised to take place on the Charlottetown Driving Park on Wednesday and Thursday, the 13th and 14th September, instant, having expired, we publish below a list of the entries in the various classes which have been filled.

Three races advertised, namely the 3-minute class, 2.50 class and 240 class, have not filled and are therefore declared off. The failure to fill in three classes will necessarily confine the races to five days only, and we are informed that the Directors have decided to hold the races which have filled on the last day advertised, viz, Thursday, the 14th September, instant.

The grand day's sport can be safely depended on for Thursday, the 14th inst., there can be no doubt from the names of the horses entered.

With the great Warren Guy, with a record of 2.12½ at the head of the free-for-all with such competitors as Minota, 2.19½, Montrose, 2.20½, and Provider, 2.21½, each of whose track performances and staying powers are so well-known, there can be little doubt but that the greatest race ever witnessed in the Province will be an event of that day.

But that is not all. The 2.25 and 2.30 classes have also been filled by horses among the fastest in the Maritime Provinces, the former by such gamey racers as Minnie with a record of 2.24 1-2, Romp L, 2.26, Joe Youngheart, 2.27 1-2, Beau Prince, 2.28, and Bijou, and the latter by Almont Wilkes, Taney, Rock Farm Grace, Loafer, Pender, jr., Fleetwood and others of equal prowess.

With such entries these two races cannot fail to be grand events.

On the whole we feel that we can confidently say that the greatest day's racing ever witnessed in Charlottetown or in the Province will take place on Thursday, the 14th, Sept. inst.

As every arrangement has been made for cheap fares both by rail and boat we believe that the day proving favorable, Charlottetown will be visited by a larger number of people than has been seen here on any previous occasion.

Log Men's Petition.

Americans who Own Timber in Ontario Want Right to Export Logs.

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 1.—Michigan lumbermen who own timber in Ontario have united in a petition to the high court of justice in Toronto, to have the regulation forbidding the exportation of logs set aside as unconstitutional.

The petition sets up that the suppliers purchased their timber land prior to the passage of the act and asks damages for the loss sustained since the law has been in force.

The beginners of the suit are Robert W. Smylie, auditor of the People's Savings Bank in Detroit, representing the lumbermen, and the Canadian Bank of Commerce of Toronto, the latter acting in the capacity of trustee of the grants. Canadian attorneys are prosecuting the case for them.
