Nova Scotian Coasts To Maritime Golf Title

DIGBY, N.S., Aug. 27. — (CP) — Dr. P. C. Jarboe of Chester, N. S., coasted in to the Maritime Senior Golf championship today, winning up 36 holes of match play with a 155 score that left him 12 points ahead of the field.

Dr. Jarboe added a 77 today to the 78 he carried yesterday over the Pines course. He easily beat out J. Gibson, Jr., of Chester, whose 167 was made up of an 84 yesterday and an 83 today.

J. M. Matthews, of Chester, four times champion, dropped down into sixth place with an 89 yesterday, but cut that score by 10 strokes today to wind up in third place. His 83-79-168 left him a bare point behind Gibson.

John Ryan, of Digby, who was tied with Gibson for second place at the end of the first day's shooting, dropped to fifth place in the final count. He slipped to 91 today after turning in an 84 yesterday for a 175 total.

Matthews' score won him the prize for the best gross for Class A, as the rules do not allow any player to take more than one prize.

Bill Gallon Wins \$7,000 Noyes Stake

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Aug. 27. — (AP) — Season records went by the boards in the grand circuit feature race at the New York State Fair today as Bill Gallon beat Florimel in the \$7,000 Noyes Stake for two-year-olds.

Florimel, owned by the Arden Homestead Stable of Goshen, N.Y., and driven by Pownall, won the first heat and trotted the fastest mile by a juvenile this year, 2:05, but Bill Gallon, owned by R. H. Johnston, Charlotte, N. C., and driven by Lee Smith, came back to cut a half second off that mark in winning the second heat, and then bested Florimel again in the two-horse runoff.

Driver Henry Thomas and the Hanover Shoe Farms scored a double on the four-race program. He drove Atlantic Hanover to a straight heat victory in the co-feature, the Second Division Pace of the Trotting Club Stake and came to win first place in the fourth division of the Trotting Club Stake.

The opening event, a 222 trot for half mile track horses, was won in straight heats by Blue, owned by J. C. Cameron of Smith Falls, Ont., and driven by Ed McKeller.

Metz Shoots Brilliant Golf To Qualify

HERSHEY, Pa., Aug. 27. — (AP) — Dick Metz of Chicago practically wasted two grand rounds of 69-71 here the last two days to capture medalist honors in the qualifying round of the annual Professional Golfers Association tournament.

For all his dead-eye shooting through the slanting rain and his inspired putting on a water-logged course, the former Texan received a medal for his pains and a trophy for his mangled.

When the real shooting begins tomorrow in the first two rounds of match play, he will be starting from scratch, just like the other 63 who qualified for the main event.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27. — (AP) — New York Yankees continued their belated drive toward the top in the American League here today by turning back Chicago White Sox in 10 innings 5-4. The victory advanced the champions within 1-1-2 games of the idle Cleveland Indians and 1-2 games of the likewise idle Detroit Tigers.

Babe Dahlgren was the hero of the 10th inning uprising after Joe Dimaggio, in the role of pinch hitter, had struck out. Red Rolfe was sacrificed to third by Tommy Henrich, Charley Keller and George Selkirk were intentionally passed by Johnny Rigney to fill the bases. Rigney then was relieved by Edgar Smith, who promptly fanned.

BEANBALL OFTEN BATTER'S FAULT

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 27. — (CP) — Ernie Johnson, who played 13 years of five-and-take major league baseball and now is the Boston Red Sox West Coast scout, believes that "guessing on curve ball" and not deliberate beanballs cause most batting injuries.

The scrappy ex-diamond star doesn't think much of the suggestion that batters wear helmets to protect them from beanballs, declaring "It's the silliest bunk I ever heard of."

Johnson added that during his playing days he dared pitchers to throw at his head and that they couldn't hit him if they tried all day.

Eire Jury Finds Nazi Bomber Guilty

DUBLIN, Aug. 27. — (CP) — A coroner's jury returned a verdict today that German aircraft dropped bombs that killed three girls Monday at Campile, on the south-eastern coast of Eire.

Several witnesses testified they saw German markings on the plane. "Evidence clearly shows that these deaths were caused by German aircraft," Coroner Fintan O'Connor told the jury.

"I do not know how anybody could for an instant suggest the bombing of Campile was in any way accidental."

Near Victories Elusive Shadow To Miss Jacobs

NEW YORK, Aug. 27. — (CP) — Pauline Beiz, Los Angeles, defeated Helen Jacobs, Los Angeles, 6-1, 5-4.

Thus was the curtain dropped a little farther on one of the few remaining links with the sports headlines of the previous year. The cold, crisp item from Manchester, Mass., forecast the approaching fadeout of a career touched with stark drama and infinite pathos: the career of Helen Jacobs, the girl who walked in a shadow.

Helen Jacobs, the stepchild of fortune, Helen Jacobs, the gamesteer whose cup of glory never was filled quite to the brim, whose hour of greatest triumph—her 1933 victory over Helen Wills—was overcast by circumstances beyond her control.

The rivalry between Helen Jacobs and Helen Wills is an epic in sports history. An even dozen times they met over a span of years. Eleven times the victor was Helen Wills, who, after a disappointing behind inscrutable, expression-strode to the net to offer congratulations. In the 12th Miss Wills defaulted.

Through these years of playing second fiddle, Miss Jacobs picked up her share of championships in minor tournaments, and when her nemesis was not entered in major tournaments, four times she won the national championship. Once she won at Wimbledon, and five times she was runner-up.

But always the victories were tainted by the knowledge that she had not met her rival. When Helen Wills (then Mrs. Moody) withdrew from competition after her default in 1932 Miss Jacobs had a field day, winning the national again in 1934 and 1935. But Mrs. Moody returned to competition in 1935, competing at Wimbledon, and again Miss Jacobs was standing in the shadow.

FOILED AGAIN

In that 1935 Wimbledon final Miss Jacobs had the long-coveted victory in the palm of her hand. Leading 5-2 in the final set she saw her advantage fade as if fate were again making her victim of a cruel practical joke. Mrs. Moody won the final set 7-5.

As if mental anguish were not enough, Miss Jacobs suffered here a share of physical misfortune through the years. An appendicitis operation, recurring ear bladder attacks, a dislocated thumb, a pulled tendon and a back injury all conspired to add to her woes.

Mrs. Moody is no longer in competition, but her withdrawal has come too late to be of much benefit to Miss Jacobs. A younger crop of stars has come to the front, with Alice Marble, a girl Miss Jacobs used to defeat decisively, now queen of all she surveys.

GREAT RACER DEAD

MELBOURNE. — (CP) — Manfred, one of the greatest racehorses ever bred in Australia, is dead. One of the country's leading sires, Manfred himself won \$28,000 (\$124,600) while his offspring are listed as winners of 553 races and stakes valued at \$103,000 (\$458,380).
