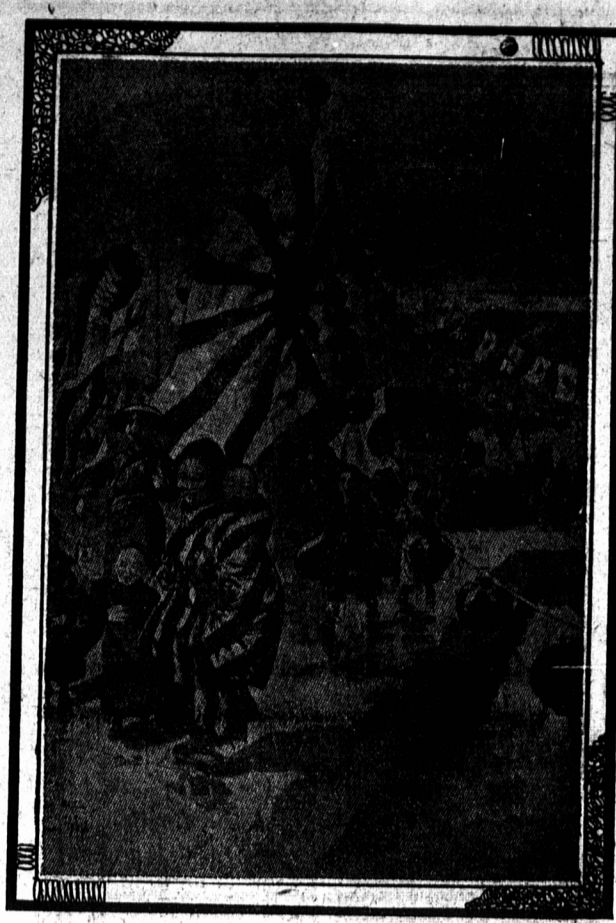

ISLAND PREACHER IN NEW YORK.

A friend of The Guardian writing from New York says:—"It will doubtless be of interest to many of the Island people, especially those who have lived in Boston between the years 1808 and 1880, to know that the Rev. Dr. J. B. Dunn, late Pastor of the 1st Presbyterian Church, Corner Harrison Ave. and Beach St. and later of the new Church, Columbus Ave. has just passed through a long siege of illness having submitted to a very critical operation for appendicitis. Four doctors were in attendance, and after consultation concluded it was too dangerous an undertaking owing to his physical condition. He was asked, however, if he wished to take the risk, and with that grit ever found in the Scotchman promptly said, "Yes, go ahead." A few days ago, I received a note from him asking me to call at his office. I did so, and found a man, who, a few months ago was only a shadow of the once vigorous and eloquent preacher, looking rugged and apparently ten years younger. Dr. Dunn has been for several years past, General Secretary and Editor to the National Temperance Society and Park House, No. 14th St., New York City. Mr. Dunn had endeared himself to the Island people not only by his eloquent preaching, but for his personal interest in them. His church was commonly known as the P. E. Islander's Church Home.
