PRODUCE

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Oct. 16--Butter, cheese and potato prices declined on the Montreal produce and dairy market today. Fresh No. 1 butter eased 1/4 cent at 19 1/2 to 20 cents a pound for car-load or less. To retailers, solids were 20 1/2 cents and prints 21 1/2 cents a pound. Receipts were 18 boxes. Cheese was slightly lower at 9 cents a pound for No. 1 Ontario white, 9 1/2 cents for No. 1 Quebec colored, 8 1/2 cents for No. 1 Quebec white and 9 cents for No. 1 Quebec colored. Arrivals totalled 1,130 boxes. New Quebec potatoes declined 10 cents at 35 cents per 80 pound bag while New Brunswick mountains at 40 to 45 cents per 80 pound bag were unchanged. Eggs held steady at 35 to 36 cents a dozen for A large, 33 cents for A medium, 28 to 29 cents for A pullets, 22 to 23 cents for B and 20 cents for C. A total of 812 cases arrived.
