**CLOSING STOCK LETTER.**

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—The weakness in U. S. Steel Common was the feature this afternoon. The Iron Age tomorrow will say "Active competition is steadily crowding prices of finished Steel closer to the Cost line." The price of Steel is discounted a bad statement for the quarter ending Sept. 30 which is pretty generally expected and therefore probably pretty thoroughly discounted. The general list did not sympathize with the decline in Steel as much as usual. Lehigh Valley and Reading showing considerable resistance to the general declining tendency, while the active speculative stocks are off fractionally to one per cent, American Cotton Oil being an exception. Virginia Chemical and Cotton Oil should show a good year in front of them owing to the enormous crop and probable low cost of the seed. The market continues to be highly professional. The Public are conspicuous by their absence; the feeling in Wall Street is decidedly pessimistic. However, the most striking feature to the writers mind, is that notwithstanding the great amount of Bearish sentiment, prices do not make material or rapid progress towards





**REFERRING TO PORK.**

Dear Sir:—Referring to our notice regarding thin hogs, we wish you to give this matter some prominence. The seriousness of the situation can only be realized by people like ourselves who are directly in touch with it, and we can assure you that we must receive the matter strong enough to receive the attention it demands.

As we state, no doubt as a result of the demand from the consumer for the product of light hogs from 120 to 180 lbs. we (farmers and packers) have gradually got into the custom of handling hogs that were altogether too thin, until today, we hardly recognize the great depreciation there is in the quality of hogs marketed.

In looking over the hogs bought on the market yesterday, I notice that not 50 per cent of them are fit to kill, and whilst a lot of them were bought at prices much reduced from those paid for best quality, yet this is not the important question. It is not a matter of buying them lower, it is simply that the product from those thin hogs cannot be sold and if farmers persist in killing them they must take them home. We must stop receiving them.

On the other hand, we do want hogs from 120 to 180 lbs.—this is what the customer demands—this is the class we can pay the best price for—but they must be well fed, properly finished, good thick hogs, and if they cannot be properly finished within these weights, they should be fed until they are properly finished and sold at their market value—which we endeavor to pay—that is equal Toronto market-conditions considered.

This matter is of public interest, and trusting it will receive the attention it deserves, we remain,

**Important Notice To Farmers And Buyers Regarding Thin Hogs**

It will doubtless surprise you when we state that fully 50 p. c. of the hogs being marketed are altogether too thin, underfed and positively unfit for packing purposes and if this is continued the Pork business of P. E. I., will be seriously injured.

We fear the practice of selling and buying thin hogs has grown upon us unconsciously, because of the demand for meats cut from hogs 120 to 180 lbs, and in the desire to get hogs within those weights, we have overlooked what is of equal importance, namely the fact that hogs at any weight must be well fed, properly finished, thick and plump, otherwise there is no sale for the product.

We have done our best to make this generally known, yet the tendency to kill thin hogs seems to be greater at present than at anytime in the past, until today it is the exception to get hogs that are properly finished.

Finally for the protection of the industry, as well as in our own interest, we must positively refuse to receive from our buyers or of the market any hogs, no matter what weight, that are not put in good condition (fat and thick) and this is in the farmer's interest as the last two or three weeks feeding must be the most profitable.
