FRIDAY

One of the most unusual medical cases ever reported in this Province occurred this week when twin babies, a boy and a girl, were born affected by a hereditary disease in the new born which is caused by an incompatibility of R-H factor in the blood of the father and mother.

The disease results in babies being born with profound anemia and jaundice and is treated by the withdrawal of the diseased blood free of the offending agent. The new blood is injected through a minute nylon tube which is threaded several inches into the babies blood stream.

The occurrence of this disease was foretold through tests by local laboratories and those of the Red Cross of Halifax. The blood and equipment for the treatment of the disease is supplied by the Red Cross free of charge.

In its first month of actual marketing operations, the Island Co-operative Services Ltd. has shipped 68 carloads of potatoes, turnips and hay and expect to ship a further quantity of some 300 carloads of agricultural produce in the next couple of months.
