New Stamps All Canadian Make

(From Montreal Gazette) A major event to the philatelist—as important as a new comet to an astronomer—the recent change of face of Canadian postage stamps has passed almost unnoticed by the ordinary letter writer.

But important it is, patriotically as well as timbologically. For the latest issue of postage stamps, post cards, postal wrappers, and air mail stamps is purely a Canadian product.

Last year the tender of the British American Bank Note Company was accepted by Hon. J. A. Robb, then Minister of Finance, and the new stamps began to make their appearance on April 1, this year, although the general public did not see much of them for some time, owing to the fact that the Government keeps a three months' supply of stamps on hand.

All denominations of postage stamps are affected. On the two-cent stamp His Majesty King George V. has changed a little. The engraving has been made from a later picture, and is refreshingly different from the two upper corners the maple leaf has come back, after being absent for many years.

Other stamps up to eight cents are the same, except for color and the figure indicating their value. Above eight cents they become pictorial. The Ottawa Government library appears on the ten-cent stamp. Double-cent stamps and over are double the size of the others, and are a regular picture gallery, interesting alike to the philatelist, the art lover, and the ordinary, everyday fellow who often grows about the little heliostism of correspondence that holds him, but likes to receive letters all the same.

One picture shows Mount Edith Cavell, snow-capped and majestic. Another depicts a prairie scene. Still another comes home to this province and represents the Citadel at Quebec, standing on the rocky heights where, in one decisive battle, the destiny of Canada was changed. A fourth view has Acadian-French significance; it is the church at Grand Pre.

The obverse has been attended to, as well as the disgruntled philistine who forwent to declare, in reaching for the paste pot, that the most important part of a stamp is the mangle, will find nothing to complain of.

An important fact in connection with the new issue is that the plant of the British American Bank Note Company is entirely Canadian owned and financed.

The Ottawa plant, recently seen by a Gazette reporter, is of the most modern type, a huge expenditure having been made to cope with the present contract. Stamps are printed, perforated, and gummed in one operation, much after the fashion in which a newspaper is printed and folded, except that the paper is wet to permit of the intaglio ("cut in") process, which is a finer finish than ordinary printing or lithographing and makes forgery or the crease of postal defacing marks more difficult.

The work is a triumph of the engraver's art and reflects great credit upon the company and upon the Hon. Charles Dunning, successor to Mr. Robb as Minister of Finance.

—LONDON, June 26.—The possibility that a general election might be necessary before fall was expressed by Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald at a meeting of the Labor Party tonight.

The Prime Minister made the statement in explaining his action in Commons earlier in the day when he announced the Government was dropping the education bill and the Consumers Council Bill for the balance of the present session.

MacDonald tonight said that in view of the likelihood of a general election before autumn, it was not desirable to face the contest with the decks littered with lumber.

In Commons today the Prime Minister said he hoped to conclude the present session of Parliament about the last of July and reassemble at the end of October. He then announced dropping of two bills explaining that because of the exigencies of other business it was impossible to consider them adequately at this session. The Consumers Council Bill proposed to regulate the retail prices of food stuffs, clothing and other items for general public consumption.
