TO SPEND MILLIONS ON LONDON HOTELS

LONDON, April 18.—Modern luxury hotels costing millions of pounds will take their place in the contour of new London during the next three years.

There is now hotel accommodation in London for 100,000 visitors, and that will shortly be increased another 2,000.

One of these modern palaces is nearing completion in Park lane, and during the last two months has risen at the rate of one floor a week, each floor comprising sixty rooms. The Dorchester Hotel is one of the greatest feats of modern hotel construction, and when it is opened in the spring will make Park lane the London equivalent of the Champs-

Elysees in Paris or Park avenue in New York.

Work has also begun near the Marble Arch on an hotel that will be a "palace of silence," for there will be no shouting boys or ringing bells.

Hundreds of workmen will be engaged in the construction of what will be the largest hotel in Europe, with 2,000 bedrooms and bathrooms.

The new building will have frontages to Oxford street, Edgware road, Bryanston street, and Great Cumberland place. There will be four restaurants and cafes of various types and a multi-store on modern lines. The promoters of the scheme are J. Lyons and Co., Ltd.

Plans are also advanced for the erection of a £1,300,000 hotel on the

site of Lansdowne House, Berkeley square, W., of 350 bedrooms, each one of which will contain a painting by a modern British artist.

Another hotel in Mayfair will be the New Curzon, rebuilt on the latest American lines.

"The hotel on the Lansdowne House site will be a palatial building of concrete, with a facade of white and gold-colored marble," a "Daily Express" representative was informed at the offices of the designer. "There will be shops on the ground floor, and the hotel building will be intersected by shopping arcades."

A site has been secured by the Canadian Pacific Railway on which they propose to build the "finest hotel in London." The area is 77,000 square feet, and faces Berkeley square and Bruton street.

This new £3,000,000 hotel will have 700 bedrooms, each with a bathroom attached, and will include six restaurants.

"THE SILVER BOX" IS REVIVED

LONDON, April 18.—(By The Canadian Press)—John Galsworthy's play "The Silver Box" was recently revived at the Duke of York's Theatre. "H. H." in The Observer says: "This drama of social contrasts adumbrates the text, one law for the rich and another for the poor, and is one of the most effective of Mr. Galsworthy's homilies. It begins, as you know, in a bourgeois dining-room and ends in a police-court, with a realism that seems absolute. And even if its characters should fail to convince you that they would continue to speak and behave as they do were Mr. Galsworthy's eye and hand not on them, they keenly engage your interest and keep your sympathies on the stretch.

"Of them all, the long-suffering charwoman, falsely accused or theft, arraigned, discharged and broken, is the most effective. I have met her several times before, but never to such tear-starting advantage as she now appears, played by Miss Nancy Price. This actress has merely to sweep the carpet to menace your peace of mind. To watch her prepare that meagre meal in her attic-home and water it with her tears, or under cross-examination by her liberal employers and the subsequent magistrate, is to realize not only Miss Price's power, but that of the play. In this heart-wringing task she is admirably abetted by Edmund Willard as her husband and bully, who sulks in bed in a manner to defy the crack of doom, and brawls in court as though the Bastille had yet to fall."

Nevada Piqued At Interest In Its Broad Laws

RENO, Nev., April 18. (U. P.)—Nevada was amazed, amused and slightly flattered at the deluge of publicity and comment throughout the nation that has been directed at this "last frontier state of the Union" since enactment of the wide-open gambling and six weeks divorce law. Nevada has served notice on the rest of the country through newspaper editorials, and speeches and letters of private citizens and public officials, that it wants to work out its own destiny, that it intends to think and act independently, preserve its own sovereign state's rights and wants other states to "mind their own business."

The people of this state, at least that articulate portion of them, declare they have nothing to apologize for and they only ask that the professional reformers leave Nevada alone.

Gambling has always existed in this state and the people were in credibly amazed when the hordes of photographers, news writers, and feature writers arrived in Reno when the gambling bill was signed by the governor to write up the fact that "Nevada has gone Old West."

Nevadans are intensely proud of their state and resent any slur upon it. But adverse comments by other states and by reformers because of gambling only has brought the charge that conditions are much worse in other states, except here they are open, honest and regulated. "About 154 years ago a bunch of patriotic fellows got together and planned a country to have personal freedom," says a typical editorial in the Winnemucca Star. "One of the leading ideals was that this new country was to be democratic and free. So they all signed on the dotted line, fought a couple of lively wars and the birth of the United States was announced."
