THE RUSSIAN ELECTIONS.

For the second time the people of Russia are engaged in electing a national Parliament, the first having been dissolved some months ago and a large proportion of its members declared to be ineligible for re-election. The voting has been in progress for some weeks but is yet not completed. A recent despatch from St. Petersburg tells that about two thirds of European Russia has chosen its delegates and two thirds of those elected are in opposition to the Government. It is also stated that St. Petersburg will return all Opposition members. In 26 Provinces where elections have been held 17 were carried by the Opposition, five by the Government and four are doubtful.

One of the prominent members of the Opposition elect has given this view of the new Parliament: "The first Douma was a Douma of anger. The next will be a Douma of vengeance." The Premier's brother gives his view of it in the following terms: "What a chaos! The new Douma will be like the tower of Babel. It will be a shame for Russia and a laughing stock for civilized Europe." These represent extreme views on opposite sides but both confirm the impression that the masses of the Russian people, even under the great restrictions imposed on their free expression of opinion and notwithstanding the promised distribution of crown lands, are still resolutely hostile to the autocracy.

Russian troubles are by no means ended. Hundreds of officials have been assassinated since the first Douma was dissolved, and conditions generally prevail such as would constitute a reign of terror in any free country.

POST OFFICE GENERAL DELIVERY

I have no doubt that personally, Mr. Wheeler is desirous that the duties of his office be properly performed, but these delivery clerks seem to be entirely beyond his control.

Only yesterday I sent my servant boy into the Post Office telling him to ask for his father's mail as well as my own. The delivery clerk gave him one newspaper (there were three for him in the office) and a letter bearing the Charlottetown stamp of the 16th of January.

I called today at the Inspector's office, but I find that there is no chance whatever of inducing these young gentlemen to do their duty. One of them tried to persuade me that the boy had carried this letter in his pocket for a month, although I had seen him deliver it to the boy yesterday, and to identify it, I endorsed the date of its delivery upon the envelope.

It seems to me a good way would be to send one's complaint to the Postmaster General direct, under the hope that these officials' conduct may be inquired into and they be discharged. I am assured, however, that they are so strongly secured by a political backing that they feel quite safe in their places, whatever charges may be proved against them.
